"Most of our labor troubles are caused by foreigners who cannot speak the Euglish language and are unacquainted with American ideas, and who cannot be taught the biguest duties of American citizenship. I think the general government abouid take prompt measures to stop unrestricted immigration. The labor organizations would sustain any party in enacting a law to remedy this

William G. Roberts, ex-vice-president of the Amalgamated association, and a prominent member of the famous Ad-visory committee of Homestead, did not

approve of the action of July 5.

The men thought the reluction was intended to force a strike, and looked upon the employment of Finkerton men as an unfair way of enforcing submission. The Carnegie company has a black list

and refuses to employ men who took part

in the strike.

Hatred for the Pinkertons caused the trouble on July 6, but the fact that the workmen do not adequately share in the profits of big concerns is what causes the reckless spirit. He said:

ABSOLUTELY PURE

GERMANY'S BUILDING.

A Handsome Structure for the Columbian Exposition.

The Materials Being Prepared at Home and Brought Over-To Be a Re-pository for Rare and Valuable Exhibits.

For several months active preparations have been going on in Germany for the erection of the empire's official hendquarters at the world's fair. Under direction of Architect Radtke. of Berlin, who has designed some of the greatest government buildings in the empire, the heavy material to be used in the building has been put in shape. Huge blocks of sandstone have been taken from the quarries and all the iron supports that will go into the massive structure have been produced in German foundries. The first consignment of this material is expected soon, and, although nothing has been done on the building so far as the work at Jackson park is concerned, except to stake off the grounds, the German commissioners confidently expect to have the entire structure finished by the middle of Oc-

The building is a combination of typical styles of German architecture. It is on the old patrician order and resembling some of the structures yet to be seen in Nuremburg. The first story of the building will be of massive blocks of sandstone, the second a com-bination of brick and cement; broad wooden staircases lead from a wide hall within to the gallery upstairs. At one end of the building an artistic effect is produced by the erection of a cathedral rather on the gothle order. The building will be massive in construction, as a large number of valuable exhibits

will probably be placed therein. Herr Schars Alquist, who represents the German commission in Chicago, said that a number of exhibits would be put in the building because sufficient space could not be secured for them in the great building of the exposition. Rare vases in silver and gold, famous statuary and perhaps many precious metals will be made to produce artistic effects in the cathedral windows, some of the most famous designers in Germany having signified their intention to assist in decorating the cathedral. The interior of the building will be finished throughout with natural woods unpainted. It is not expected to have a particle of plastering or papering in the building, not even on the ceilings. Rich designs in natural wood effects will be a feature of the interior. August Fiedler, a German architect, has volunteered to super intend the construction of the building, which is to cost \$125,000.

BULL FIGHTS FOR THE FAIR.

Two Spanlards Arranging to Introduce

Their National Pastime in Chicago. People may not have to go to Spain or Mexico next year to see a bull fight. If the plans now being perfected not frustrated that amusement will be among the attractions of the world's fair. Juan Fernandez Villamil, of Havana, and Cyrus Berazaluce, of New York, are in Chicago arranging for the establishment near the exposition grounds of an arena in which baited balls will battle with men and horses, as in Madrid, or Rio del Norte, across the Texas line. These two senors intend to build an amphitheater having a scating capacity of sixteen thousand people, in the center of which will be the ring, one hundred and fifty feet in diameter, in which the battle takes place. The Spaniards intend to reproduce the exhibition precisely as it is given in their native country. They conducted a similar entertainment at the Paris exposition, which was highly successful. Large crowds of all nationalities attended every performance and exhibited great pleasure every time a horse was gored or a pleador had a narrow es-

It is possible that the city authorities would object to such an exhibition, but in that event the Spaniards would tone the real fight down to meet the requirements of the most finisky alderman. The bull fights would then be only imitations of the gory affairs of old Spain. The animals would wear rubber tips on their sharp horns and the fighters would carry tinsel swords. But the two men don't want to be compelled to give such a tame performance, and are anxious to show the American people what a real bull fight is like. The more danger to the bull fighters, they say, the more interesting is the show. The fair authorities are inclined to encour age the enterprise.
