### EARTHQUAKE IN SALVADOR.

The Seaport Town of La Union Destroyed and Many Persons Killed.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 28.—A private letter from La Union, Salvador, gives details of the complete destruction of that city by an earthquake. The letter was received yesterday by the steamer City of Sydney, from Panama. It says: "An earthquake laid low nearly all the houses in the city, and those left standing had their walls so cracked that it was not safe to remain in them. The residence of the agent of the Pacific Mail company, which was comparatively new and supposed to be earthquake-proof, was shattered by the shock. The people are living in tents, and are in mortal fear of another disturbance."

A passenger on the City of Panama, which called at La Union on the trip, and which was subsequently passed by the City of Sydney, writes that he went ashore and visited the ruins. The desolation was complete. The residents of the city were almost driven to frenzy, and processions were parading the streets ringing bells and headed by the priests, who prayed aloud to God to abate the disturbances.

A large number of persons were killed and many seriously injured. No mention was made of disasters to shipping, and it is presumed that there was no tidal wave. Neither had any information been received from other places, as the means of communication are slow, and the extent of the earthquake was unknown at the time the City of Panama called at La Union.

### RELICS FOR THE FAIR.

United States War Vessels to Convey Them to This City.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Notwithstanding opposition in the Navy Department, it is certain that a U. S. Naval vessel will be assigned the duty of conveying to this country the exhibit of relics relating to the discovery of America loaned by the Vatican from its museum for the World's Fair.

Unless some well-founded reason should intervene, the United States cruiser Newark will be given the assignment.

It has also been practically decided that the United States gunboat Bennington shall convey the Columbus caravels from Huelva to America.

### Will Demand a Fire Station.

NEWPORT, Nov. 28.—As a result of the burning of the Vanderbilts villa, cottagers who yet remain here are preparing to demand that a fire station be built in the midst of the cottages and that it be equipped with a hook and ladder truck, a steamer and a hose cart, all manned by permanent men.

Seattle's Smallpox Plague. SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 28.—Two new cases of smallpox were discovered in this city yesterday, a colored man and a girl. Both were removed to the pest house. Twenty-two patients still remain at the pest house suffering with the disease, twelve of whom are convalescent.

### Veragus Will Loan Columbus Relics.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—The Department of State has received from Madrid a formal note from the Duke of Veragus granting the request of the President for the loan of the Columbus relics in the possession of his descendants for exhibition at the World's Fair.

### Egan to Return to Chili Soon.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 28.—Patrick Egan, Minister to Chili, is expected in this city to-morrow. He will return to Chili in a few days.

### NEWS OF THE DAY.

—Bridgeport, Conn., is to have a \$255,000 hotel.

—Eighteen miners were killed by a cave-in at the Borja Mine at Pachuca, Mexico.

—The Rev. Mr. McCree, the celebrated Baptist temperance reformer, is dead in London.

—Michael Fritz, a veteran of the war of 1812, is dead in Friedensburg, Pa., at the age of 95.

—In the past week 40,000 barrels of 1892 whiskey have been sold at Louisville as New York houses.

—Gen. Setelli, who, as a novelist, wrote under the nom de plume of "Paul DeLuca," is dead in Paris.

—Aaron Behler, who had been town guardian of New Haven since 1834, died there yesterday, aged 80.

—The trustees of Billston, N. Y., have offered a reward of \$500 for the detection of the incendiary who has been operating there.

—William C. Dean, of Friendship, N. Y., has been sued for \$20,000 damages for alienating the affections of Hotelkeeper Smith's wife.

—Over 1,000 cases of typhoid fever developed in St. Louis last week. Very few have proved fatal. Physicians claim that the germs are in the water.

—Francis Lingo, the central figure in one of the most remarkable murder cases ever tried in the courts of New Jersey, is now a dime museum freak.

—Burglars in East Worcester, N. Y., stole a large quantity of clothing, shoes and cutlery from two different stores and \$175 worth of stamps from the postoffice.

### TOSH WINS HIS SUIT.

A Claim for Services in the Hoff Cases. A Terrible Verdict.

Constable Tosh on Saturday secured a verdict on an arbitration at Pottsville against Max Reese, Levi Refowich and others for the sum of \$60, and \$2.70 interest from the 4th of last May. Tosh's claim was based upon detective services he claims to have rendered. It will be remembered that last spring the Hebrew merchants of town were very much incensed by circulars printed in the Polish and Lithuanian languages denouncing the Jews, urging that their business places be boycotted and that they be driven out of the town. Tosh claims that Reese, Refowich and others, in the heat of the excitement caused by the circulars, employed him to try and locate the parties responsible for the printing and distribution of the papers and he was to receive \$100 for the work. Tosh says he performed the work and the parties who employed him refused to pay him more than ten dollars.
