-She Ploaded Guilty. Loxison, Dec. 15. — Gwyneth Maude, the young woman accused of swindling Watertown, N. Y. Mesara. Spink & Co., Picadilly silversmiths, pleaded guilty when arraigned at the Old Bailey Assizes.




