PERSONALLY CONDUCTED TOURS AND THEIR GROWTH.

SMOTHERED IN THE GRAIN. Young McDermury's Mother and Friends Were Correct in Their Belief.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The body of Patrick Macdormury of Brooklyna, New York, has just been found in the hold of the Annonor Lin steamship Bolivia, at Glasgow from New York, embedded in the grain. This shows that the mother and friends of Macdormury were correct in their belief that he had been smothered in the grain when the steamship was being loaded, and that his body was in the grain.

While the vessel was working in one of the hatches of the vessel. The import cargo from the third hatch had been taken out and a lighter alongside was chuting grain into it at the rate of several tons a minute.

The officers of the ship were of the opinion that Macdormury had gone ashore, and in spite of the suspicion that his body was in the grain the loading of the vessel was permitted to go on without interruption.

Mrs. Macdormury went to the steamer distracted with grief and anxiety, and asked the officers not to go to sea with the body of her son. They held to the opinion that he was not aboard and sailed away.

BLAIR IS HOPEFUL. The Ex-Senator speaks before the Labor Federation Convention.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 15.—At the third day's session of the American Federation of Labor the Committee on Resolutions reported a plan to create national or international unions whenever seven local unions of any craft had been formed. President Gompers took part in the discussion which followed, expressing the view that it would not always be practicable, owing to the weakness of newly formed unions.

The debate was suspended by the appearance of Senator Henry W. Blair of New Hampshire, who addressed the assembled delegates on his proposed improvement of the common school system. The speaker expressed the belief that a revolution of sentiment has taken place in favor of the Blair Educational bill, which may result in its passage by the next Congress.

He was particularly hopeful, because of the increased favor with which the public schools have apparently been regarded by the Roman Catholic Church.

CARNOT MAY RESIGN. Reported That His Father and Brother Are Implicated in the Scandal.

PARIS, Dec. 15.—The rumors that President Carnot will resign shortly are confirmed. At Tuesday's Cabinet meeting during the dispute between M. Ribot and M. Rouvier, the President interposed the remark:

"The action of certain ministers renders my retention of office almost impossible." M. Rouvier thereupon left the meeting declaring that he would resign. President Carnot's difficulty is increased by the reports that his father and his brothers are involved in the Panama Canal scandal. President Carnot himself, and not M. Ribot, was the one who sent to M. Tirard the despatch:

"I call upon you as an old friend of my family not to refuse office. If you do I will resign to-morrow."
