WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—Representative Pierce of Tennessee, the prominent free silver advocate during the last session, has given up all hope that the question will be reached this Congress, and indeed expresses his belief that the silver cause will be side-tracked for four years.

THE CHILIAN INDEMNITY.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21.—The \$75,000 paid by the Chilean government in settlement in full for all claims arising out of the Baltimore affair at Valparaiso have just been covered into the sub-treasury at New York.

The draft for that sum was brought to this country by Minister Egan in October last. It was drawn on the bank of France and called for payment thirty days from date of presentation.

Mr. Egan gave it to the Secretary of State. It then went to the Secretary of the Treasury by whom it was sent to the Assistant Treasurer at New York.

Its negotiation was then entrusted to Seligman & Company, bankers, by whom collection was duly made through their agents in Paris and this part of the transaction was closed by the deposit of the money at New York.

These necessary preliminaries having been performed and the money now being in the actual possession of the government, arrangements will be made as soon as possible for its equitable distribution to the people for whom it is intended.

Gideon Marsh in Africa. PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 21.—According to information brought by the Philadelphia ship Jacob E. Ridgway, from South Africa, Gideon W. Marsh, the fugitive Keystone bank president, who was supposed to have been in Brazil during the summer, was in Cape Town last October and soon left for the Rangoon, when he was identified and became known as a Philadelphia bank wrecker.
