Killed on the Railroad.

Thomas Gaughan, a resident of Lost Creek while walking on the Lehigh Valley railroad at about 9 o'clock last night to visit friends at No. 2 was struck by the passenger train due here at 9:14 o'clock and instantly killed. It is All to Him.

The old man became quite judgmental because he had been disturbed and was by no means sparing in his criticism. Yet there was a bystander who condemned the policeman in unmistakable terms because he threatened to put the man on the lockup. But this remonstrance was only made in an undertone.

RICHARD KIMBALL DEAD.

The Distinguished Literary Man Passes Away at New York. Aged 76.
New York, Dec. 29.—Richard B. Kimball, a distinguished literary man, is dead in this city at the age of 76.

Ten days ago he completed the most important work of his life, a valuable collection, entitled "Half a Century of Recollections."

His first book, "St. Leger," appeared in the famous Knickerbocker Magazine more than 50 years ago.

This work was at once translated into the French, German and Dutch languages, and gave the author a commanding rank among American authors.

WILL MEET CORBETT AGAIN.

Sullivan Says He Intends to Begin Training at Hot Springs Next May.

New York, Dec. 29.—John L. Sullivan refused to be interviewed at the Windsor theatre, where he has been playing, in regard to Jimmy Wakely's statements that the ex-champion was an inmate for making attacks on his honor.

He, however, told Dan Murphy, who met him at the wind-up of the performance that he would yet meet Jim Corbett, and will start in to train at Hot Springs, Ark., next May.

CHOLERA RIOTERS SENTENCED.

Eight to be Strangled, Four Go to Siberia for Life, and Others Imprisoned.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 29.—A court martial in Tashkent has passed sentence on the leaders of the cholera riots on July 6. Seventy men were tried. Eight were sentenced to be strangled; four to the loss of all civil rights and deportation to Siberia for life and 43 to long terms of imprisonment. Twenty-five were acquitted.

Noble's Death Was Accidental.

Newark, N. J., Dec. 29.—Further investigation has shown that John W. Noble, the foreman of the Bloomfield Avenue Lacrosse Works, in Newark, whose frozen body was found beside the tracks of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad at Harrison, Tuesday, met his death simply by accident.

May Have Committed Suicide.

PATERSON, N. J., Dec. 29.—William S. Kinch, a member of the firm of Richard Warren & Co., soda water manufacturers, of this city, has been missing from his home since last Tuesday. He had been feeling unwell lately, and it is feared that he committed suicide while mentally deranged.

Crew Rescued by Life Savers.

PROVINCETOWN, Mass., Dec. 29.—Fishing schooner *Welcomes* of Gloucester is ashore near Race Point. The crew of sixteen men were brought safely to shore by the life saving crew. The vessel will likely be a total loss.

To Become a Western Newspaper Man.

MANCHESTER, N. H., Dec. 29.—Frank M. Rollins, business manager of the Manchester Union, has severed his connection with that paper, and it is understood will assume the proprietorship of the *Denver, Col., Sun*.

For a New Athletic Club.

New York, Dec. 29.—It is currently reported on pretty good authority that a syndicate of wealthy sporting men is about to start an athletic club in the vicinity of New York.

Has Not Been Invited to Baltimore.

BALTIMORE, Dec. 29.—It has been ascertained that the report that Dr. McGlynn has been invited to Baltimore is without foundation.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

—Minister to England, Lincoln has returned to his post.

—An effort is making by several prominent Chicagoans to buy Independence Hall in Philadelphia, the house where Lincoln died in Washington, and the Surrender in Maryland, with a view of transporting them to Chicago for exhibition purposes.

—Every distillery in Cincinnati is being run at its full capacity in anticipation of an increase of tax.

—It is said in Chicago that a movement is on foot among the coal dealers in the Hocking Valley, Ohio, to effect a combination which will be a formidable rival to the Reading system.

—John Bouvier and Emma Shea of Portsmouth were drowned while skating on the lake at Kingston, Ont.

—President-elect Cleveland has declined the invitation of Gov. Flower, of New York, to attend the latter's reception to the Legislature and the Presidential electors at Albany on Jan. 8.

Closed Its Work.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 29.—The International Board of Promotion of the World's Columbian Exposition has closed its work with the fulfillment of the object of its efforts, namely, to have Italy officially represented at the World's Fair, C. F. Y. Caraccioli and Prof. Fava, who have been at the head of the movement, are very jubilant over their success which has led to the appointment of a commission by the King of Italy.

TOWN POLITICS.

The Time for Getting Ready is Close to Hand.

Nothing as yet has been done by either party to call a meeting of the respective committees. Little over a month remains in which to nominate candidates and get the election machinery in operation under the new law, so there is not much time to spare.

There are numerous candidates for the different offices, but they are reluctant to make their announcements known through the papers at the present time.

The present incumbents of the offices of Chief Burgess and High Constable will have determined opposition in the ranks of the party to which they belong, while for Receiver of Taxes the present incumbent will have a clear track. He has proved himself a safe and reliable official and he deserves to be re-nominated by his party.

In the several wards there will be a great scramble and several bitter contests, especially will this be the case in the Third ward.

If the Citizens wish to hold their own in the coming election they will have to get a move upon themselves, otherwise the party will awaken to find itself in a very small minority.
