BENJ. F. BUTLER DEAD.

He Expires Suddenly in Washington This Morning—Heart Failure the Cause of His Death.



WASHINGTON, Jan. 11.—Benjamin F. Butler, of Massachusetts, died at his Washington residence on New Jersey avenue at half-past one o'clock this morning.

His death is supposed to have been due to heart failure. He was one of the leading lawyers of the country, and served a number of terms in Congress, was a Major General in the Union army during the rebellion, and was also Governor of Massachusetts for one term.

SIR EDWARD WATKIN.
For years the question of tunneling the channel has been a subject of contest in England. In France the idea is received with enthusiasm, but British public interest is not so easily gained, and the weight of military authority is against it. Sir Edward Watkin has again urged the matter and as he has secured the influence of Gladstone, the successful issue of the project will probably be only a question of time. A good beginning was made as far back as 1861, and the portion completed invites inspection as a specimen of thorough engineering.

Sir Edward William Watkin, of Northenden, Cheshire, is M. P. for Hythe. He was born in 1819 and was formerly a Manchester merchant. He has occupied many civic and political positions and is extensively interested in railways, being chairman of three different lines.

In 1868 he was knighted. In 1845 he married Miss Mary Briggs Mellor, daughter of Mr. Jonathan Mellor. Sir Edward's only son married a daughter of the Duchess of Cambridge.
