IN JAIL FOR FORGERY.

Misdeeds of a Prominent Citizen of Georgetown, Mass.
HAVERHILL, Mass., Jan. 16.—A sensation has been caused in Georgetown by the arrest of Frank Vining, a prominent citizen and Sunday school superintendent, who, by his own confession, is a forger.
Over two years ago Vining came to Georgetown with good references and purchased a half interest in business with Harold F. Blake for \$10,000, paying \$1,000, and giving notes as collateral for the balance. The notes bore gilt edged names, but Vining always opposed their negotiation, and finally confessed that they were forged.
He confessed also to forging other notes, the amount aggregating some \$11,000, of which the Georgetown National bank has \$5,500, the Savings bank \$1,000, and Mr. Blake the rest.
These were mostly settled by the parties interested, and Vining given a chance to reform.

Within a few months, however, other checks endorsed by Vining and bearing the signature of D. L. Outon, of this city, have been presented to and endorsed by the Georgetown bank.
Outon having no funds there, these transactions led to Vining's arrest.
He is in jail in default of \$3,000 bail.

MR. BLAINE'S RESTFUL NIGHT.

Dr. Johnston Says His Patient Has Not Lost Strength.
WASHINGTON, Jan. 16.—There are no developments in Mr. Blaine's case other than favorable. When Dr. Johnston left the house this morning he said that Mr. Blaine had passed a quiet, restful and uneventful night.
There has been no appreciable change in his condition during the last three days and none is expected during the day.
In answer to an inquiry Dr. Johnston said that to all appearance Mr. Blaine had not lost any strength since his attack last Thursday, and on the whole he regarded his condition as favorable as could be expected.

FIFTY WERE KILLED.

Terrific Explosion of Dynamite on the Congo Railroad.
LONDON, Jan. 16.—A despatch to the Central News from St. Paul de Loumba says: "A train crowded with Europeans and natives was halted on the Congo railroad near Matadi, recently, and the engine was detached to join a wagon loaded with 54 boxes of dynamite and 82 casks of gunpowder."
"The engine moved down grade with great speed and collided with the wagon, exploding the dynamite."
"Fifty persons were killed, including M. Lequeur, head of the Societe Anonyme Belge."

Matched to Skate Three Races.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., Jan. 16.—Dareld Cagen, the Norwegian skater, who claims the championship of Europe, and Hugh McCormick, of Canada, have been matched to skate a series of three races in this city, Jan. 21, 23 and 24 for \$1,000 a side and receipts.

Preparing for a Big Skating Race.
REB BASK, N. J., Jan. 16.—Great preparations are being made for the skating races which are to take place on the North Shrewsbury river, at Red Bank, Wednesday afternoon, under the direction of the North Shrewsbury Ice Yacht club.

For a Fleet of Coast Vessels.
BOSTON, Jan. 16.—A charter has been tentatively incorporated the New England Navigation Company. The company proposes to build a fleet of large coasting vessels to ply the coast from Eastport, Me., to the Gulf.

May Cause a Break in the Triple Alliance.
ROME, Jan. 16.—The report from Rome of the ill feeling caused by Capri's allusion to Italy's weakness in the event of war, is looked upon here as foreshadowing a break in the triple alliance.

To Pay His Salary to His Widow.
BOSTON, Jan. 16.—The Transcript Newspaper Company has notified the widow of its reporter, killed in the Federal street fire, that his salary will be continued to her indefinitely.

Russian War Vessels Coming.
St. Petersburg, Jan. 16.—Russia will send three warships to Hampton Roads to take part in the naval demonstration in connection with the Columbian festival.

The plant of the American Mining and Milling company at Fort Jefferson, N. Y., was burned last night. The total loss to buildings and machinery is \$29,000.
—John Owens' wood and paper box factory at Haverhill, Mass., was destroyed by fire last night. Loss on stock, \$5,000; on building, \$4,000. Seventy-five hands are thrown out of employment.
—For the second time in history an ice gorge has formed in the Mississippi at Memphis.
—Captain Edward Hubbard, who is dead at Cornwall, N. Y., was 91 years old. He has been a pilot of over 30 vessels on the Hudson River.

OUR PICTURE GALLERY.

Portrait of Joseph Donoghue, the Champion Skater.



The failure of the Norwegian skater, Nor-seng, to meet our champion, Donoghue, at Minneapolis, was a great disappointment to lovers of that exercise, who much desire our amateur to gain a professional record. If Harold Hagen also declines to skate, it will look as though the Norwegians feared to peril their reputation.

Joseph Donoghue made his first appearance in Europe at Amsterdam on January 8, 1889. He was unopposed by a fall in the half-mile contest for the world's championship on that day. The following day Von Panschin, the Russian champion, defeated him in the mile race by two yards, the time being two minutes, fifty-eight and four-fifths seconds. Donoghue defeated Von Panschin, in the two mile race, on January 10, being seven seconds ahead of the Russian and covering the distance in six minutes and twenty-four seconds, the best time on record. Three days later Donoghue and the Russian raced at Vienna a mile, with Von Panschin the winner by the fifth of a second, making the distance in two minutes and fifty-seven seconds. At Hamburg, on January 15, Donoghue defeated the German champion, Harms. In Europe he defeated everybody opposed to him except the Russian champion, who was a man twenty-eight years old.

Donoghue says: "I will skate one or more races against H. Hagen on any fair course within 150 miles of New York city. He to select the course, name the days and the number and length of the races. I will skate him for \$1,000 a side, or if he has no money will skate him for a bunch of bananas. And finally, if he will skate me a race, five miles straight away, on the Hudson river, over a course to be selected by himself, any where between New York city and Albany, I will give him twenty seconds start in five miles."

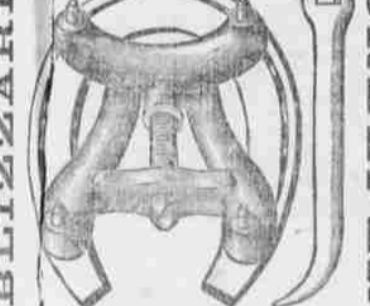
