NAMED FOR SENATORS. Elections and Nominations in Several

STREET. ALRANY, Jan. 18 .- A number of spec tators, including several of the heads of departments, were assembled in the cham ber when the Senate was called to order after the morning vecess.

The Lieutenaut-Governor announced that in accordances with the United States Statutes the Senate would proceed to ballot for Senator. Each Senator was in his place and named his choice as his name was called.

The result was as follows : Total votes cast, 30; for Edward Murphy, jr., 17; for Frank Hiscock, 12; for Whitelaw Rold, 1.

The vote was a party vote with the ex-ception of Senator Edwards who, in voting for Mr. Reid, said: "It is sometimes agreeable to walve ersonal preferences in deference to the

views of others; but in this case I see no reason for doing it. I intend to cast my remean for doing it. I intend to dist my vote in the manner that will, for me, best answer the question : "Who is the flutest man to represent the State in the United States Senate?" I therefore cast my vote for that eminent diplomatist and distinguished journalist, the Hon. Whitehaw Beld."

The election of United States Senator

drew a large audience to the Assembly chamber. A resolution declaring that the best in-

terests of this State require the only re-peal or supersion of the act authorizing the monthly purchase of silver bullion by the United States, was adopted unanimously.

A recess of fifteen minutes was then taken At 12 o'clock the House was called to

order. By this time it was crowd-ed. There were only two or three mem-hers absent, and the call was suspended without sending for them. The roll was then called for the vote for United States Senator and each man rose in his seat and named his choice.

When the Speaker formally amounted the choice of the House as, for Edward Murphy, jr., 73; for Frank Hiscock, 52; there was general appliance from the Democratic side of the House. The absentees were Messrs. Adams, Denniston and Vandewater, all of whom


were excused. SENATOR FROM CONNECTICUT.


