#### PUBLIC SCHOOL MATTERS.

Superintendent Freeman Sends Away the Wretched Fair Exhibits. The exhibits which the public schools of this town will make at the World's Fair are complete and Superintendent Freeman has packed them in boxes and forwarded them to the State Commissioners at Harrisburg, who will have them forwarded to the National Committee at an early date.

If the newspapers of the country devote any space to the educational display at the fair the Shenandoah exhibit will occupy some of it, for it is certainly a splendid one. Some of the papers are really grand in execution and those who have examined them feel certain that they will be among the exhibits to receive the honor of special mention.

The exhibits number between 2,500 and 3,000 and have been completed at the patient expense of much time and labor on the part of teachers and pupils. Superintendent Freeman has also expended much care and time in properly classifying and packing them, so that the Commissioners will have little trouble to make a proper display. They include map drawing from the Third and Fourth grade primary and First and Second grade grammar schools; arithmetic from all grades except the High School; language from all the primary schools except the First grade; and all the other schools have two subjects each, language and arithmetic. The papers of the High School cover natural philosophy, which embraces many excellent pen and ink drawings suitable to the subject; Latin, trigonometry, algebra, mental philosophy and chemistry.

Mr. Woolsey, of Scranton, the arbitrator selected by the fire insurance companies, and Josiah W. Johnson, of town, the arbitrator for the School Board, spent Saturday viewing the damage done by the recent fire in the High school building. It is understood that the conference between the two gentlemen was of a very harmonious character and the report they will submit to the School Board is likely to be of such a character that all concerned will be satisfied.

The School Board will hold its regular monthly meeting on Wednesday evening. As the usual meeting place is unfit for occupancy by reason of the fire the Board has arranged to make use of room 6 in the West Centre street school building for its meetings until such time as the damaged building is repaired.

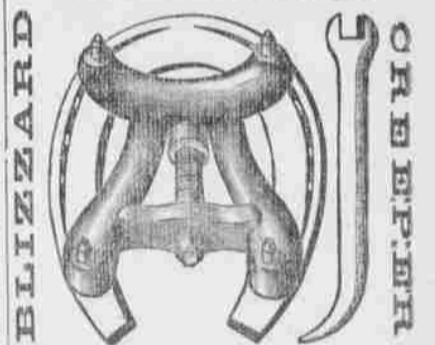
