## SATISFACTORY TOURNAMENT

The Sports Who Attended the Girardville Contests Satisfied.

About two hundred and fifty sporting men attended the first tournament of the Schuylkill Athletic Club at Girardville, Saturday night, and the pastime given them seemed to amply repay them for their journeys and presence. Prominent sports from all sections of the county attended the contests and they left the place satisfied.

The first contest was between Gill Ferguson, of Leont Summit, and Mike Gallagher, of Girardville. Tim Hurst, the National Base Ball League umpire, was referee of "the job." Gallagher was the heavier man, but Ferguson got the decision for clean hitting at the end of the fourth round.

The second was an eight-round contest between Kirk, of Pottsville, and Ford, of Mt. Carmel. The former weighed 111 pounds and the latter 145. Kirk exhibited some science, but he was clearly outclassed. In the third round he was knocked down four times and the last time he was carried to his corner "dead to the world." Jimmy McFale, the famous Philadelphia pugilist, acted as referee for this bout.

The third event was the feature of the evening. Ike Wier, the famous "Belmont Spider," and Frank O'Brien, of Philadelphia, stepped upon the stage to show the auditors what they could do in the manly art. Hurst was upon the platform as referee. It was a satisfactory bout, from a scientific point of view up to the fourth round, when O'Brien quit.

#### ALL STILL AT PINE RIDGE.

No Troops to be Sent There—The Reported Indian Uprising.

RAPID CITY, S. D., Feb. 6.—The reports of danger from discontent among Pine Ridge Indians caused by the murder of four cowboys Friday are unfounded. The Humphrey and Steeger band of cattlemen were killed by a wandering band as a result of a quarrel early in the week. Col. Carlton, of Mauds, has countermanded his orders, and no troops will be sent to Pine Ridge, all being reported quiet there.

The Pacific Mail Steamship, City of Pekin, is now fifteen days overdue from Hong Kong and Yokohama at San Francisco.

A club called the Washington Club, composed of Americans and German-Americans residing in Berlin, has just been formed in Berlin.

The Federal Bank of Australia is winding up its affairs in consequence of the persistent withdrawal of deposits by customers in Australian colonies and in England.

Gov. Rich of Michigan, has signed the bill repealing the Miner election law.

The Missouri House has passed a bill making the maximum charges in the State for telephone services \$40 per year.

Engineers in their report estimate that the deep water canal proposed to run from Lake Superior to the Erie will cost at least \$500,000,000. The canal would be 345 miles in length, have 20 locks and a large number of costly aqueducts. The canal will have to be 30 feet deep and 200 feet wide.
