

A BIG STRIKE THREATENED. Satirond Traffic in Chicago Reported to be on the Verge of a Tie-Un.

CHICAGO, Feb. 7 .- On authority from several reliable sources, it seems more than probable that within 10 days a berculean attempt will be made to tie up every car and locomotive in the city, and paralyze the traffic on many thousands of miles of tracks.

So apprehensive have the officials of one of the Eastern trunk lines become that, it is reliably reported, they are re-fusing to receive eastbound freight and traffic from Western lines.

Starting with the unorganized switch-men, the disaffection has spread until, it is claimed, the various branches of unor-ganized employes will unite in one of the most determined strikes over known in

railroad annals.

The switchmen have decided to demand The switchmen have decided to demand an advance of five cents an hour from their present pay, and to strike if they do not get it. This important action was taken at a meeting of committees, repre-senting the 27 railroad yards in this city. The new scale demands 30 and 35 cents an hour, respectively, for day help, and from 85 to 40 cents an hour for helpers and

foremen working at night.

The demand will be made upon sev eral roads centring here as soon as peti-tions can be circulated among the men in the respective yards and a majority of the signatures obtained. The peculiar feature of the movement

is that the regular organizations of the switchmen are entirely ignored in the new move, and that it is a general move-ment on the part of the men irrespective

of the heads of the old organizations.

Telegrams from points along the line of the Penusylvania railroad indicate that the company expects trouble at an early date over the question of wages, as they have refused perishable freight at many points destined to Chicago, and the Pittsburg, Fort Waye & Chicago railway offifreight, on the ground that they expect trouble on the road with the engineers.


