FLOOD CHECKED BY GOLD

Danger Believed to be Over for the Present.

RIVERS STILL RUNNING VERY HIGH

It Was Thought Last Night that a Great Inundation Was Imminent in the Allegheny Valley—Reports of the Rise of Waters from Many Points.

ERPSBURG, Feb. 8.—The flood that threatened this town, since the Allegheny river has, it is thought, been checked by the cold weather and the worst is now believed to be over.

The unexpected rise of the Allegheny river caused great consternation among business men and residents along Duquesne way and lower Pennsylvania avenue, as well as among the residents of lower Allegheny.

Those living or doing business along the river front have removed all perishable goods.

The tracks of the Pittsburgh & Western road are several feet under water within the city limits.

When the big gorge of ice in the Beaver river at Rock Point broke it caused much damage. At one point the track of the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie railroad was washed out for over a mile, while for a distance of several miles the tracks are piled high with ice.

All of the many factories along the river have been compelled to shut down while some of them have been badly damaged.

At Erieport, on the Allegheny river, the lower part of the town, three squares back from the river, is inundated and people are fleeing from their homes, which are being pointed to pieces by the huge blocks of ice.

Many boats and rafts of lumber have been torn from their moorings and destroyed.

At Du Bois the water in the Sinnemaheoning river is at flood height, and several other rivers along the stream are preparing for a flood.

At Newcastle the Neshannock creek is rising at the rate of two feet an hour, and it is feared that the lower part of the town will be inundated.

There is an ice gorge two miles long at Volant, and people living on the lowlands between Newcastle and Mercer have moved out of their homes.

The water in the Neshannock, at New Castle, is higher this morning than for many years.

During the night it rose eight feet and a portion of the southern part of the city was inundated, several houses were swept away and many families were rescued in boats.

The Beaver river is also reported rising rapidly and the officials of the Pittsburgh & Lake Erie Railroad have discontinued the sale of tickets to points west of Beaver.

The pleasure boat, Uncle Jake, moored at the Forty-second street bridge, was swept by the ice, and a dozen slanty boats had their sides crushed in.

The water poured in so rapidly that the occupants barely escaped with their lives.

Flood Feared in the Mohawk Valley. ALBANY, N. Y., Feb. 8.—The ice in Schenectady creek, near Bartonville, broke up yesterday morning and came down stream into the Mohawk river about a mile west of Fort Hunter and has lodged there. The ice in the Mohawk at that point is still intact.

The river has overflowed its banks at many places and among those living in the lowlands there is great fear of a freshet which will flood the valley and do much damage.

Antelex at New Brunswick. NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Feb. 8.—The ice above the landing bridge a mile from this city has broken up and formed an ice gorge 15 feet high at the bridge.

As the ice is still solid from this city to Albany bridge, a distance of nine miles, the greatest fears are felt that the lower part of the city may be inundated and the New Albany street bridge damaged.

The Saucy Level With Its Banks. FRENCHTOWN, O., Feb. 8.—The Sandusky river has risen over ten feet since last night and is now level with its banks.

The extreme cold weather may check its rise unless the ice gorge formed south of this city gives way, when an overflow will undoubtedly follow. People living in lower and exposed portions of the city spent last night in watching.
