HUGH O'DONNELL'S TRIAL.

Testimony of Newspaper Correspondents Who Were at the Riot.

PITTSBURG, Feb. 15.—The afternoon session in the O'Donnell trial was given up to hearing the testimony of newspaper correspondents who were present when the riot occurred.

Frank McQuiston testified that he was up in the cupola with O'Donnell during a part of the battle. A number of other correspondents were present, and O'Donnell wanted them "not to see anything which could be used as evidence."

George Campbell, editor of the West Elizabeth Star, said that he was standing on the river bank when the rioters were pumping the oil at the barges, and he heard some one behind him say: "That is no way. Build a raft, load it with oil, set fire to it, and let it float down against them."

He turned around and saw it was O'Donnell. On cross-examination witness said he did not know for sure that O'Donnell said that, but he heard the words, and on looking around saw O'Donnell standing there.

Harry Goswami, of the Pittsburg Dispatch, was in the cupola and corroborated the other witnesses.

In conversation with O'Donnell about the matter, he said, speaking to several men: "Gentlemen, this is no longer a riot, it is a revolution."

Robert W. Herbert, another Dispatch reporter, said he was in bed at the Carnegie hotel when the general alarm was sounded.

When he came out men, women and children were running about, shouting, calling to each other, and making all manner of noises.

"It was," said Mr. Herbert, "the wildest, most thrilling scene of excitement I had ever enjoyed."

"Did you enjoy it?" asked Mr. Patterson.

"Yes, I really enjoyed it," said the witness, and then everybody laughed.

Mr. Herbert was still on the stand when court adjourned.

During the session in the morning W. H. Burr, who had charge of the Chicago contingent of the Pinkertons, testified that O'Donnell called out: "Don't shoot. If you come ashore every one of you will be killed."

Joseph Malloy, another Pinkerton, testified that O'Donnell gave orders to armed men on the bank, and replaced one man with a pistol with one who had a shotgun. He then came to the bank and called to Capt. Cooper that he wanted to talk to him.

Skater Drowned in Long Island Sound.

MOUNT VERNON, N. Y., Feb. 15.—Frank Hermanns, 23 years old, and two other young men, of New Rochelle, went skating on Leroy's Bay, an inlet of Long Island Sound, near Travlers Island, Monday. Hermanns left his companions and started to skate out on the Sound alone despite their protests that it was not safe. He has not returned, and it is thought he has been drowned.

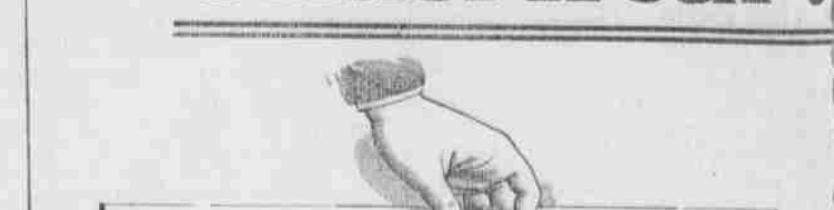
