"SQUANDERED SURPLUS." The Democratic press keeps repeating the charge that the Harrison administration has squandered the large surplus in the national treasury which existed when it came into power.

Here are the facts: The surplus in the Federal Treasury March 1, 1889, at the beginning of President Harrison's administration, was \$183,827,100. This surplus no longer exists for several good reasons.

First: Because payments of the public debt have aggregated since March 4, 1889, up to December last, \$29,072,600, which reduces the annual interest charge almost \$12,000,000.

Secondly: Because the pensions paid during the Harrison administration aggregated \$487,000,000, which is \$170,000,000 more than was paid for pensions during the Cleveland administration.

Thirdly: Because under the new tariff law up to December last, as stated by President Harrison in his last message, about \$93,000,000 of revenue, which would have been collected upon imported sugars if sugar had not been made free, has gone into the pockets of the people instead of into the treasury.

Fourthly: The direct tax refunded to the states of the Union by the Harrison administration (which tax refund measure had been opposed by President Cleveland), distributed \$11,000,000 from the surplus in the Treasury to the states, while the sugar bounty for the protection of American sugar growers during the past two years has taken \$18,000,000 from the surplus in the Treasury, and distributed it among American sugar producers.

These are the facts and the figures that no one will undertake to controvert. Will any one say that the reduction in the public debt, with a consequent large decrease in the annual interest charges, was "a squandering of the surplus"? That the making of sugar free, with a large reduction in its price and consequent decrease in custom receipts, was a "squandering of the surplus"? That the return to the states of taxes improperly levied upon them in time of war was a "squandering of the surplus"? The surplus was accumulated in the Treasury to meet extraordinary demands, to pay its obligations ahead of maturity if possible, and to keep the country as it has been kept throughout President Harrison's administration—con tented, peaceful and exceptionally prosperous.
