So far as Mr. Weldman is concerned, personally, we have nothing to say. The appointment belonged to the Republicans in the Interest of a non-partisan judiciary, as two of the three seats on the Bench are now filled by "Demograts. The Philadelphia Press covered the point fully when it said:

"In making an appointment of a Common Pleas Judge in Schuylkill county Governor Pattison did Inst. show that breadth of mind which would have been most creditable to him, and at the same time indicated ing subscribers to the fund. 
