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ARCHIBALD J. McLEOD.

The new paper critic of Archibald A. McLeod who is attempting to resign him from the Boston and Maine Railroad Company could have witnessed his reception this week by his fellow directors.

Mr. McLeod took the Reading Railroad from the hands of the reorganizers, improved its property the first year, earned something on the income and paid it in the second year, and earned the full interest on all the income bonds last year and paid it.

First—To sacrifice the assets of the company as previous managements had done.

Second—Surrender the financial control to rival property interests, as it was expected he would do.

Third—Take the protection of the courts and maintain the company's assets intact.
