### "UNCLE SAM'S" FARM

It is a common remark that the public land suitable for settlement for farming purposes in the West's nearly exhausted, and that soon the intending settler will be unable to obtain a farm from "Uncle Sam" on the favorable terms which have been offered in the past.

It is true that the patenting of land to settlers is no longer on the Increase. The number of acres actually "preempted" or "homest-adel" shows a general tendency to diminish. In the fiscal year 1801-93 the government naturated to all classes of occupantsacreculturists, miners, purchasers of awamp lands, railroads, Tudinas and so on-somewhat, more than timeteen middon access, against nearly twentythree million sares in the year 1803-91. Of agricultural lands, nearly three million agree fewer were potented to settlers in the last freed than in the year preceding. This shows that the tide has mrnud.

extent to the public demain will remedicing is vast. In cound numbers the vacant lands belonging to the United States gavernment, outside o Abels, still amount to five hundred and all y millions of nores-an area more than sleven times that of the great state of Minnesota.

But of course this vast area Includes an immence domain of mountains and other lauds hopelessly unavailable for settlement. Only about one-half of it has been surveyed, and the other half is believed to include little land. that is likely to be worth cultivating for agricultural crops.

But the hand sillt open to agracultural settlement, including that which may be made valuable by trrigation, still bears a large proportion to the amount which is annually taken up for agricultural purposes.

The largest body of surveyed vacant land now in the hands of the government is to be found in the Territory of New Mexico. It consists of nearly forty million acres. Wyoming comes next to the list, and Colorado and California are close behind. In all these states and territories irriga-tion is necessary for cultivation. tion is necessary for cultivation.

But if "Uncle Sam" has lost by settlement a great proportion of the land that may be given away or sold to settlers which does not require irrigation, he also has a source of supply of such lands. Since 1889 about thirty million acres of land, much of it good agricultural land, have been released by Indian tribes, and restored in Pittsburg, and is used by the railroad to the public domain.

All this may be said to be put in the way of settlement by white farmers, and the released Indian land is the object of a general demand on the part of intending agricultural settlers.

This process is accompanied by an allotments of lands in severally to Indians. There have been more than kind in the past four years.

The release of Indian lands by tribes to whom land is being given in severalty will continue, but certainly not fast enough to supply the demand for it.
