NOT A WORD OF DISSENT.

President Cleveland's Nominations Confirmed.

NOT REFERRED TO THE COMMITTEES.

The Senate Disposes of Much Important Work in Executive Session—Not an Objection Offered to Any of the Nominations—A Discussion Relative to the Re-Organization of Executive Officers.

WASHINGTON, March 21.—In an executive session lasting little more than a half hour, yesterday afternoon, the senate disposed of a great deal of work that has accumulated pending the re-organization of the committees. All of the earlier branches of nominations those of ex-Senators Eastland and Hampton made in the morning, were confirmed without the formality of a reference to the appropriate committees. When the reports of the various committees were made, all of them favorable, there was not a word of dissent and the utmost harmony prevailed, so far as any word of opposition was concerned, at least. The nominations were confirmed in the ordinary way, without a vote, there being no objections offered.

During the session there was a short discussion relating to the proposed re-organization of the executive officers of the senate, the republicans taking occasion to let the democrats know the determination of their caucus. In a casual way the republican leaders referred to the president and stated that there was no authority for the re-organization of the senate at an extraordinary session, and warned the democrats with due regard to parliamentary courtesy that they would not sit idly by and see the work of re-organization prosecuted without attempting to frustrate it. The matter was held in abeyance, however, pending the action of the caucus of the democrats which is to be held to-day. It is understood that nothing bearing upon the proposed re-organization will be discussed in open session until after another executive session shall have been held.

At the executive session the republicans intend to propose, and if the democrats then see fit to undertake the task of re-organizing the executive officers, the contest will be transferred to the open session. It is understood that certain prominent democrats have said that rather than remain here and engage in an unseemly dispute, they would be in favor of permitting the present organization to remain until congress meets in regular session. If there is to be a struggle over this matter, it will, it is thought, be precipitated before the end of this week.

Don't Want Martin Recognized. WASHINGTON, March 21.—A delegation of anti-fusion democrats from Kansas are trying to convince Mr. Cleveland that Mr. Martin, the new senator from Kansas, has no right to recognition as a democrat and should not be permitted to have any say in the distribution of offices. They found this protest upon the claim that he is seeking to use the patronage in the interest of the populists. The democrats in the senate have recognized Martin as a democrat, but some of those who have heard wisdom from experience say that a protest against any senators having the distribution of patronage under this administration is entirely unnecessary.

Discussed the Errors. WASHINGTON, March 21.—The numerous errors that have come to light in the enrollment of great appropriation bills at the last session formed the subject of discussion for nearly an hour of the time that the senate was in session yesterday. More than 90 such errors were stated by Mr. Hale to have been discovered by him in the naval appropriation bill alone. Various resolutions as to clerks of committees, changes of rules, etc., were offered but not acted on, and the senate adjourned until Wednesday.

To Make Uncle Sam a Valuable Present. WASHINGTON, March 21.—Truxton Deale, United States minister to Greece, has informed the state department that the willow of Dr. Schlemmer, the famous expert of the ruins of buried and ancient cities, has determined to present to the United States national museum a portion of the "vases unearthed at Troy by his husband. Mr. Deale gives no intimation of the size of the collection to be sent to Washington, but says its value will be apparent on inspection.

Road Over Twelve Years. KITTANNING, March 21.—After being out thirty-nine hours the jury in the case of W. J. Ryand, charged with murder and attempted bank robbery at Leeburg, came in and handed in a verdict of guilty of murder in the second degree. The judge then discharged the jury and sentenced Ryand to twelve years in the penitentiary. The case of Dr. Wilcox Spathe, alias Spathe and Kromer, under arrest on the same charge have been postponed until the June term of the court.

Two Persons Crushed to Death. NASHVILLE, Tenn., March 21.—Fire at Athens, Ala., destroyed several stores and small buildings. The total damage done will not exceed \$60,000. William Chandler, a student in the agricultural college, and Owen Brown, of Athens, were caught under falling walls and crushed to death.

Want the Pool Rooms Closed. BRIDGEPORT, Conn., March 21.—All clergymen here are urging their congregations to organize and petition the state legislature to pass laws to close up all pool rooms and to frame a law sufficiently strong to convict and punish offenders.

Had Run the Engine Since the War. BELLAIRE, O., March 21.—William P. Porterfield, a Baltimore and Ohio engineer died here, aged 80 years. He was an old soldier and had been running the transfer engine across the Ohio river since the war.

Sold by Creditors. ST. JOSEPH, Mo., March 21.—The wholesale liquor house of the James Walsh Mercantile Company was seized by creditors. The liabilities so far aggregate \$141,798. The assets will, it is reported, aggregate \$170,000.

A \$170,000 Fire in Massachusetts. SOUTH EASTON, March 21.—E. J. W. Moore & Company's large brick cotton thread factory was reduced to ashes. Loss on building and machinery, from \$170,000 to \$200,000, only partially insured.

A Lively Blaze at Covington, Ky. COVINGTON, March 21.—Walsh's distillery was completely destroyed by fire. The loss is estimated at \$100,000, partly covered by insurance. The origin of the blaze is a mystery.

THE STATE LEGISLATURE

What Our Lawmakers are Doing and How at Harrisburg.

PROCEEDINGS IN BOTH BRANCHES.

Both Houses of the Legislature Hold Lengthy Evening Sessions—Many Memorials and Petitions Read in the House—The Anti-Pinkerton Bill, up on Second Reading, Goes Through Amended.

HARRISBURG, March 21.—Both houses of the legislature held sessions last evening, and in each there were many absentees. The house of representatives convened at 5 o'clock and remained at work for several hours. Many memorials and petitions were read by speaker Thompson, consuming about a half hour.

Representative Knicker had the bill prohibiting the fouling of streams by dust or other reported back to committee.

The anti-Pinkerton bill of Mr. Keane came up on second reading as special order. It went through amended. The bill now provides that no sheriff of a county, mayor of a city or other person authorized by law to appoint special deputy marshals or policemen to preserve the public peace, and prevent or quell public disturbances, shall hereafter appoint as such special deputy marshal or policeman any person who shall not be a citizen of the commonwealth, or an individual, company or association incorporated under the laws of the state or any other state.

Mr. Tewksbury asked that his anti-pass bill be placed upon the calendar. There were cries of "no," "no," when he arose to speak. Disregarding them with lovely contempt, he remarked that he would not make a long speech. That he would do when the bill was placed upon the calendar and carried over the house. As reasons for giving this Mr. Tewksbury pointed out the injustice of a few persons enjoying special privileges and the wrong in compelling the masses to pay for their pleasure. He stated that about 10 per cent. of all the passengers rode on free tickets. If this is wrong, in said, obey the constitution, if it is right, amend it.

When the vote was taken Mr. Koyser asked that the vote be called. He called. There was much merriment at the vote of several members. The motion of Mr. Tewksbury was defeated by a vote of 81 to 40.

A concurrent resolution was agreed to withdrawing the appropriation from any wild institution using oleomargarine.

There were lively discussions by lot when two or more persons have an equal number of votes in townships and boroughs, thence.

Authorizing and requiring constables to make returns by mail to court. Costna.

Authorizing the assessment for local improvement in cities of the third class, thence.

Increasing the limit at which persons are exempt from mercantile taxes to \$1,000; also, placing the duties now performed by mercantile appraisers on the real estate assessors, thence.

Amending an act relating to annexation in cities of the third class, Beck.

The session of the senate was devoted exclusively to the transaction of routine business.

There is a growing feeling among the members of the legislature to close up all the work by May 1st, so that when the body returns from Chicago the members can immediately return to their homes.

SHE SAVED THE LAD'S LIFE. Miss Mary Gorman Distinguishes Herself at Paterson, N. J.

PATERSON, March 21.—Miss Mary Gorman, a young girl employed at the Strategic mill, saved the life of Jacob Smith, a bobbin boy.

The lad's waistcoat caught in the huge belt and he has drawn up about two feet, when Miss Gorman saw him. She ran towards the boy and caught the revolving belt with both hands. Her strength was about to give out, when one of the men employed, attracted by her screams, ran to the spot and cut off the belt.

Miss Gorman faintly as soon as she saw the lad's life was saved.

GOMERS WANTS THEM TO PROTEST. He Asks Labor Unions to Discourage the Proposed Russian Treaty.

NEW YORK, March 21.—Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, has addressed a circular to the trade and labor unions of America urging them to join in making a united protest against the proposed treaty between the United States and Russia.

All unions are requested to send resolutions of protest to the president, the secretary of state, the senate and to the newspapers throughout the country. The circular insists that our country must forever remain the asylum for all who dare brave danger for freedom's sake and seek refuge from persecution of tyranny and despotism.

Fatally Wounded His Brother-in-Law. WEST STOCKBRIDGE, Mass., March 21.—Thomas O'Brien has been drinking heavily for some time. Sunday night he threatened to kill Richard Healey, his brother-in-law, who refused to loan him some money. Yesterday he went to Healey's house, broke the glass in a window and struck Healey. Healey drew a pistol and shot him in the head. The wound will prove fatal. Healey fled to Chatham, N. Y., where he was arrested. He will be brought here on a requisition. The men are miners.

A Hotel Company Organized. NEW YORK, March 21.—The Grand Hotel Company, of Mexico, has been organized in Jersey City for the purpose of building a hotel in the City of Mexico. The capital stock is \$500,000, in shares of \$100 each. The directors of the new company are Charles Condit, of New York, 75 shares; Manuel A. De Lizardi, City of Mexico, 50 shares; Daniel J. Holden, New York, 25 shares; Stephen E. Hatch, New York, 25 shares; Robert O. Bullock, Jersey City, 25 shares.

Five Men Burned. PITTSBURGH, March 21.—Duquesne village, near Homestead, was the scene of a disastrous fire which consumed a row of eight or nine frame tenement houses yesterday. The fire was caused by the upsetting of a lighted lamp among the shavings in a cellar. The occupants were all foreigners. The total loss is \$12,000, partly insured.

No Penetration for the Report. LOSON, March 21.—Doubts have been cast on the authenticity of the reports concerning the loss of Russian convicts in the snow while being conveyed to Siberia. The report is said to be without foundation.

Prairie Fires in Oklahoma.

GUTHRIE, O. T., March 21.—Prairie fires have been raging extensively in different parts of the territory during the past twenty-four hours. In Cleveland several houses and a number of barns, besides many tons of hay, were destroyed, and a little girl so badly burned that she will die if her injuries. In Payne county large areas of land were swept clean of everything, and east of here, in a negro settlement, a number of houses were burned with all contents.

The Convicts Go Back to Work. BROWN, March 21.—The convicts in the state prison who have been locked in their cells for two weeks partly as a disciplinary measure and partly to allow a rigid search of the workhouses and prison for contraband articles, have resumed their various occupations in the shops. General Bridges, the new warden, is placing the entire institution under military discipline. Everything is quiet in the prison.

A Good Wood Crop in Texas. SAN ANGELO, Tex., March 21.—Wood showing has fairly commenced. The first clips of the spring feller were marketed on Saturday. The staple, owing to the excellent condition in which the shaggs have passed through the winter, will be far superior to the productions of this market at any previous time.

A Shipping Clerk Crushed to Death. PITTSBURGH, March 21.—John Driener, 33 years of age, a shipping clerk at S. H. Hamilton's music store, was crushed to death by a piano elevator. His head was caught between the side of the elevator and a cross beam, which crushed it to a pulp. He leaves a widow and several children.

Now They Employ Electricity. HOMETOWN, March 21.—Electricity is being employed here to do the work of the bookers-up on the 23 and 30-inch mills.

THE TRUNK WAS FULL OF MONEY. The Hidden Fortune of the Late Washington Heck Unearthed.
