GAUGHT BY A RUSH OF GOAL.

PRING OF '93- Intending buyers A Shipper's Arm Caught Between the Bumpers of Coal Cars. Neither Accident Very

WO accidents at Kehley Run colliery formed quite a co-incident yesterday afternoon. The victims of the accidents were John W. Hoskins and George W. Davidson, but neither was injured seriously. Hoskins had a knee joint twisted and Davidson

suffered a crush of the right arm. He narrowly escaped losing it.

When Hoskins was at work in a breast of the colliery there was a sudden rush of coal. In striving to get away Hoskins was caught by the coal and when he tried to release his right leg he dislocated the knee joint. He was taken to his home on South Plum alley and among those who helped to take him there was his brother-in-law, George W.

Davidson is employed as a shipper at the Kehley Run colliery. After assisting in taking Hoskins home he returned to the breaker. As a lossled train pulled out a coupling broke and Davidson hastened to make another polled yesterday. coupling. As he was in the act the bumpers met and caught his right arm, just below the sibow. All who saw the accident felt sure that the arm was either cut off or so badly rushed that amoutation would be necessary but upon examining the limb they were sur prised to find that only the muscles of the arm had been masked. ELECTRIC EXTENSIONS. Surveyors Were at Work on Centre Street

A corps of surveyors to day commence aying out the proposed electric rallway owan, St. Nicholas and Mahanoy City. It s proposed to run the connection from the main live at the corner of Main and Centre his side of the last house on the south sid of that street. The road will then leave the mblic highway and run on the embunkmen shind the house mentioned until it strike he road above Indian Ridge colliery. The ine will then run a short distance toward Yatesville and then turn south and again ross the Ellengowan read, thus avoiding th steep grade and the knoll just above Indian Ridge breaker. After striking the Etlenmwan road the second time the line will run sear the old pienic grounds to make its way mar the Ellengowan colliery and over to St. Nicholas. But these plans may be changed after the surveyors finish their work and make a report. The object in not following the highway from here to St. Nicholas is to avoid heavy grades.
