THE NEWS IN GENERAL

Chicago has broken out at Philadelphia and many deaths from the disease are reported daily.

Eight deaths from grip were reported at the office of the board of health in New York City yesterday afternoon.

August Humer, his wife and two children, were drowned in the Thames river in London, by the capsizing of their pleasure boat.

The damage done by last week's blizzard in the northwest, says a Chicago dispatch, is now figured up to be in the neighborhood of \$7,000,000.

On Good Friday the regular holiday schedule of collections and deliveries will be observed by the post office, the day being a legal holiday.

By a premature explosion of a blast in the "Found-by-God" mine, near Leadville, Colo., two miners were instantly killed and three others fatally injured.

Eleanor Duse, the Italian actress, who has been seriously ill in Chicago for several days, was reported by her physicians this morning as being out of danger.

General E. Kirby Smith, who died at Sewanee, Tenn., on Tuesday afternoon, will be laid to rest in the cemetery in the city with military honors to-morrow.

The body of the St. Catherine's (Out.) business man, who committed suicide at Niagara Falls, was found yesterday afternoon in the river near Lewiston, N. Y.

Richard Croker, the Tammany chief, says there is no truth in the report that he has made an offer of \$1,000,000 for the purchase of the Jerome park race track.

There is a bill before the New York legislature at Albany asking for an increase of \$1,000 per year in the salaries of aldermen in New York City. The salaries of the aldermen are now \$2,000.

In the trial of Dr. Buchanan in New York City, for the murder of his wife, much damaging testimony is being introduced. Even the prisoner's friend has testified against him and at the present time things look just a trifle dark for the accused's case.

Norris Neal, formerly of Dennison, Tex., where he had a wife and child, meeting Mrs. Mary E. Davis, of Paris, Mo., of whom he was enamored, received a curt refusal to listen to his advances. He used a revolver, fired twice at the woman and then fatally shot himself. The woman was not hurt.

John L. Woods, the banker and philanthropist of Cleveland, died at Augusta, Ga., where he had gone for the benefit of his health. Mr. Woods was known to be a man of large wealth, but during the last five years he practically gave away the great bulk of his fortune.

In Atlanta, Ga., United States Judge Newman has filed an opinion concerning the action of the United States court for the Eastern district of Virginia allowing the Richmond and Danville railroad, to issue receivers' certificates to the amount of \$100,000.
