HEADED OFF THE REVOLUTION.

Rebels brought to grief by the authorities in Costa Rica.
PANAMA, April 1.—A conspiracy to bring about a revolution was discovered in Costa Rica and suppressed through the energetic and cautious action of the government. The leader in the conspiracy was Gutierrez, who recently returned from exile to which he had been condemned on account of a previous revolt against the government, and who has been impatient to overthrow those who had extended clemency to him on that occasion.
The authorities being fully aware of the intentions of the rebels determined to seize the latter to proceed with their plans and capture them in the act of treason. The government was completely successful, and in order to prevent any further disturbances, the country was placed under martial law. The government intends to inflict such severe punishment on the offenders as will be a warning to others.

THE NEWS IN GENERAL.

Mrs. Maria Walton Morris, wife of William H. Morris, died at her home in Orange, N. J.
The date for the reciprocity convention, to be held in St. Paul, has been fixed for June 5.
A new wagon bridge is to be built across the Mississippi river at Quincy, Ill., during the coming summer.
Albert Hamlin, a brakeman on the Alton railroad, was cut in two by a train at Joliet, Ill., while coupling cars.
Robert T. Lincoln, United States minister to England, will sail for America the latter of May or the first of June.
An average of fifteen deaths a day for the past week have been reported in St. Petersburg as a result of the cholera scourge in that city.
John Price, a notorious character, was sentenced at Baltimore to seven years' imprisonment for attempting the life of Carrie Rock.
It is rumored in Cincinnati that some of the stockholders of the whisky trust will ask for a receiver. The rumor is denied by officers of the trust.
Frank P. Stacy and Jim Hall have been matched in London to fight inside of two months for a stake of \$2,500 a side and the largest purse offered.
Mike Chantlers, in jail at Sacramento, Cal., was confessed that he is the man who murdered Fred Pittman some months ago at Huntsville, Tenn.
Peter Maher, the Irish champion pugilist, will travel with "Denver" Ed. Smith. He will be the Denver man's sparring partner at a salary of \$100 per week.
August Verblaski, a switchman on the Rock Island railroad at Davenport, Ia., had both arms and both legs cut off by a locomotive while at work in the yards in that city.
The Pacific coast has been visited by a hail storm, which, for destructiveness, outclasses anything of the kind known in that region for many years. The damage resulting from the storm will reach far up into the thousands.
The board of health in Hanzburg is preparing for another siege of cholera this year and several hospitals have been erected in the suburbs of the city, where cholera patients will be treated should the fearful disease make its appearance when warm weather sets in.
Two cars of a passenger train on the Southern Kansas railroad were derailed by a misplaced switch at Williamburg, Kan. The passengers on the train were all badly shaken up, but none were seriously injured, although the two derailed cars rolled down an embankment over fifteen feet, turning completely bottomside up.

AN OFFICIAL APPOINTMENT LIST
Being Prepared by secretary of the Treasury.
WASHINGTON, April 1.—Secretary Carlisle is having prepared a list of the employees of the department with the salaries they receive, and will have it arranged by states. When completed, it will show the number of employees credited to each state, the aggregate salary the people from the state receive, and a column showing what by the law of apportionment the state should receive.
The list has been prepared already to such an extent as to show a great disproportion among the states, some of the states having many more clerks than their proper quota and others less.
The District of Columbia is credited with more than 1,000 out of 4,000 employees, when its quota, it is said, should only be eleven people. Secretary Carlisle, it is understood, intends by every means in his power to reduce the District of Columbia's list of employees, that the states may receive their proper quota of appointments.
