A Fire Boss Drops Thirty-Bix Feet Down a Chute But Escapes With Slight Injuries - Au Explosion of Gas.



MERE was a remarkable occurrence on the Lehigh Valley railroad west of Brownsville this morning. As en gine No. 168, in charge of Engineer John Te manus was descending the mountain grade the

flange of one of the tank wheels broke. The roken piece was about two feet in length, The engine had forty loaded coal car schind it and this great weight on the steep grade made it impossible for the engineer to ring the cars to a stop until they had run quite a distance, when the broken whee mught in the rail and turned the tender completely around. This hatted the train The broken wheel tore the sills and other wise considerably damaged the track during the descent. It is considered remarkable that only the tender left the rails and there was not a general wreckage of the loaded

The accident happened at about 11 o'clock. Arrangements were at once made for all trains to use the west bound track and there was no delay to traffic. A wreck crew went to the scene of the accident at noon and frer about an hour's work removed the Himbled tender.
