FROM AROUND THE STATE

Happenings of Importance from All Sections.

GATHERED FROM HERE AND THERE.

Rev. Mr. Bretz, of Reading, Ordained as a Minister of the Gospel at the Meeting of the Presbytery in Easton—Miners Escape in Safety From the Inundated Lake Fiddler Colliery.

FAVOR, April 20.—The semi-annual meeting of the Presbytery of Lehigh opened yesterday in Brainerd Presbyterian church, this city. The attendance of ministers and lay delegates is unusually large, and considerable interest is manifested in the proceedings. Rev. T. Calvin Stewart, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of South Easton, the retiring Moderator, presided the opening sermon on "The Kingdom Come," after which the Presbytery elected Rev. T. J. Lee, pastor of the Second Presbyterian church of Easton, Moderator for the ensuing six months. Rev. A. M. Woods, of Mahanoy City, is stated clerk, and Rev. J. W. Blachoff, of Upper Lehigh, recording clerk of the session. Luther M. Davis and A. Loux, of Easton, Lafayette graduates, were received under the care of the Presbytery as candidates for the ministry.

Last night there were addresses by Rev. J. G. Williamson, of Hazleton, and Rev. W. Y. Chapman, of Reading, after which Rev. Mr. Bretz, of Reading, who has been called to the pastorate of the South Bethlehem church, was ordained as a minister of the gospel. Rev. Mr. Bretz is a member of this year's graduating class at Princeton Theological seminary.

There was a lively discussion on the adoption of a resolution instructing commissioners to the general assembly "to act in accordance with deliberations of past assemblies." It had a special reference to the bridge matter, and was adopted by a vote of 45 to 18. The major portion of the minority consisted of graduates of the Union Theological seminary. The action of the Presbytery in instructing commissioners is considered as something unusual.

The District Court's Finding Affirmed.

PHILADELPHIA, April 20.—Judge Acheson filed an opinion in the United States circuit court of appeals yesterday affirming the finding of the district court at Pittsburgh in a dispute arising in the bankruptcy of John Carrier and A. F. Batus, trading as Carrier & Batus. In June, 1874, a creditor filed a petition in bankruptcy against the firm, and it was declared bankrupt. In January, 1880, E. C. Carrier, the brother of John Carrier, filed with the register a proof of debt against his brother for \$25,000. The claim was at first disallowed, but afterwards, on exceptions, the court admitted it. The master was appointed by Levi Bird Duff, the assignee. There is now at stake a dividend of some \$7,000.

Wants \$10,000 Damages.

READING, April 20.—The case of Fritz Grohman against Alderman Kirshman, of this city, is on trial before Judge Endlich. The plaintiff seeks to recover \$10,000 damages for alleged false imprisonment. Grohman languished almost forty days in jail, through a suit before the above named alderman upon the charge of battery, of which he was afterwards acquitted. The trial is attracting a great deal of interest.

The Tax Rate Increased.

READING, April 20.—Notwithstanding that the public schools of this city will receive a state appropriation this year of \$51,000, being the largest since the school district was established, the members of the board of education have deemed it necessary to increase the tax rate to four and one-half mills. The entire revenue of the board this year is estimated at \$106,000. Three new school houses will be erected.

The Miners Escaped Uninjured.

SHENANDOAH, April 20.—Yesterday afternoon Superintendent Williams announced that it had been ascertained positively that all the men had escaped from the inundated slope of the Lake Fiddler colliery. The colliery is operated by the Mineral Mining and Railroad Company and 500 hands are employed. The damage to the mine is not serious.

Ploughed a Box of Colas.

PHILADELPHIA, April 20.—A farmer residing near the city has ploughed several miles south of this place a curious looking box with ploughing. It contained several live Colas, three gold watches, ten chains, a number of gold pens, and some rare American coins.

Beaver Factors General Meetings.

PHILADELPHIA, April 20.—During the week ex-Governor Beaver and General Hastings have been in the city. The former is warmly in favor of the latter for the republican gubernatorial nomination, and has had conversations with leading politicians with reference to the matter.

Frederick Brown Dead.

SCHUYLER HAVEN, April 20.—Frederick Brown, a prominent citizen of this place, died after an illness of four weeks, aged 83 years. He held a number of positions of trust, and had been a resident of this borough for thirty-five years.

Another Fire in the Colliery.

AMBLETT, April 20.—Fire has again been discovered in the mines at Potts colliery, Leesdale, and all work in that section of the mine had to be suspended. The fire has been burning for the past few days, but could not be reached.

Four Years Past the Century Mark.

HAZLETON, April 20.—Mrs. Sarah Bager, of Frenchtown, has just celebrated the 104th anniversary of her birth. Mrs. Bager reared a family of ten children, all of whom were present at the anniversary.

BRIEF PENNSYLVANIA ITEMS.

NO ORDERS YET ISSUED

To Stop Redemption in Gold of Treasury Notes.

A TREASURY DEPARTMENT DENIAL.

Nothing to be Done in the Matter Until the Emergency Arises—No Action Taken Only in the Form of Personal Letters of Warning—Program for the New York Naval Review.


WASHINGTON, April 20.—At the treasury department yesterday it was emphatically denied that any order had yet been issued to stop the redemption in gold of the treasury notes of 1890, and the statement was made that absolutely nothing would be done until the emergency arrived. If any action has been taken it is probably in the form of a letter of warning of a personal character to the assistant treasurer in New York, informing him what the policy of the treasury department will be in case the five gold entirely disappeared, but which might be used as an order if necessary.

It is believed that so far as possible the treasury will come to the aid of the secretary of the treasury and supply him with sufficient gold to meet the present demand. It is stated that the issuance of bonds would probably be the last method that the treasury would turn to if a crisis should arise. The policy of the department would likely be, first, the stoppage of the gold payment on the treasury notes; second, the use to a certain extent of the gold reserve, and finally the bond issue.

If the last course was finally reached, it is thought that they would not be disposed of on this side of the water, as this would only bring a temporary relief. In this connection the visit of J. Pierpont Morgan, of this city, just before his departure for Europe and his consultation with Mr. Carlisle are recalled. It was stated in press dispatches that if Mr. Morgan had any mission to perform for this country it was probably the arrangement for the depositing in foreign countries of bonds in case they were issued. This belief is now strengthened.

Secretary Carlisle stated yesterday afternoon that he had \$1,178,000 free gold in the United States treasury. This was obtained Tuesday and yesterday principally from the west in exchange for small notes and relieves the tension at least for the present. Secretary Carlisle declined to discuss the present situation or the probability of future action.

Naval Review Program.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—The navy department yesterday afternoon issued the following program of arrangements in connection with the naval review at New York:

1. A banquet by the chamber of commerce to the officers of the review fleet, on the evening of the 27th inst.

2. A reception at the City Hall, New York, on the morning of the review fleet, on the 28th inst.

3. Carriages will be provided by the chamber of commerce to take the officers from Forty-second street, North river, to the City Hall.

4. The review of the fleet will be followed by a land parade of marines and sailors from the vessels and from 2000 of the foreign troops as they are willing to join. The men to land at Forty-second street, North river, march by Forty-second street to Fifth avenue, then to Fourteenth street, then to Broadway, then by the City Hall, then to embark at the most convenient point to return to the ships.

5. The navy secretary, General Meigs has been detailed to take the Duke de Venetia and his suite during the review, and will follow in line with the reviewing vessel. Master General Solofield and Rear Admiral Bellhop will accompany the duke. Commander Goodrich has been detailed to take charge of the General Meigs.

6. It has been agreed that the ministers representing the different countries shall present their officers to the president on board the Dolphin.

7. There will also be a banquet on the night of the 27th by the Grant Monument Association at which Secretary Harbert will be present.

The President Received Them.

WASHINGTON, April 20.—For the first time since the adjournment of the senate, the white house yesterday was free to all who came to see the president, and contrary to the expectation of a number of interested observers, there was not a great number of office seekers. Many senators and representatives called between the hours of 10 and 12 o'clock and at noon all others who came on business were admitted. There was a great crowd of these and Mr. Cleveland had his hands full attending to their wants, but an hour sufficed for the reception of all.

There were no appointments yesterday. Hereafter the appointments will be made public at noon, and at that hour only.

Attachments Against the Globe.

NEW YORK, April 20.—The sheriff has received another attachment against the Globe Press Association, of No. 88 Warren street, which has branches in Boston and Pittsburg, for \$4,500 in favor of Gustavus T. Deane & Co. The attachment is for \$5,400 and the sheriff is in charge of the case. The company was incorporated under New Jersey laws in March, 1901, with a capital stock of \$1,000,000. It is said that there has been a want of harmony among those interested and efforts have been made to re-organize the company.

Arrested on a Serious Charge.

MONTREAL, April 20.—William Goldenblom was arrested here, charged with bringing stolen jewelry into Canada. The valuables belonged to A. Goldfinger, of New York city. Goldenblom was remanded.

Two More Storm Victims Dead.

OSAGE CITY, Kan., April 20.—Two more of those injured in yesterday's cyclone here died at an early hour this morning, making a total of five lives lost as a result of the storm in this city.

A Great Chess Player Dead.

BELLEVILLE, April 20.—Jean Dufresno, a celebrated chess master and author, died here at the age of 34 years. He was chess editor of the Gazette and also an illustrated weekly.

Whitney Boys May Cost Lives.

HALIFAX, April 20.—H. M. Whitney & Co., the principal stockholders in the big coal syndicate, have bought for \$275,000 the Georgia mines at Cove Bay, C. S.

The Schooner Kidnapped Fleeted.

BENTON, L. I., April 20.—The schooner M. E. Eldridge, of Dunstable, Mass., which went ashore of Eaton's Neck last January, has been floated.
