Madison Square Garden Thronged With Distinguished Americans and Foreigners The Mammoth Structure Elaborately Decorated-A Banquet Closes the Evening's Festivities.

The entire evening was epent in a most admirable display of international friend-ship, the like of which bus never before been witnessed in this country.

Two hundred members of the naval re-serve acted as a guard of honor to escort the guests and their escorts to their boxes Mayor Gilroy occupied the centre box over the Madison avenue entrance of the garden. The president occupied a box to the right of the mayor, the Duke of Vera-gua being assigned to the left of the

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
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
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
