CHICAGO, May 1.—The fact that all the buildings at Jackson Park are not entirely completed and all of the displays not yet finally arranged in their proper positions, did not prevent the throwing open to-day of the World's Fair to visitors from all nations on the face of the globe, as had been arranged over two years ago when the gigantic enterprise was officially sanctioned by the United States government and our neighbors in foreign lands.

Over a week had been spent in decorating the business places and residences for the great occasion and as a result the metropolis of the west presents to-day a gigantic panorama of glittering splendor, such as has never before been presented to the gaze of the people on this side of the water, if not in the world. Every one of the mammoth business structures on State and Clark streets, Chicago's two principal business thoroughfares, are literally covered with flags and red, white and blue bunting woven into every conceivable design, known to the professional decorator, and the decorations in general are far more elaborate than those hung out on the occasion of the dedication of the World's Fair buildings last October.

President Cleveland, after performing the distinguished task of setting the machinery in motion, held a reception in liberal arts hall and shook hands with all who could push their way through the crowd and get close enough to him to do so. People tumbled over each other in an effort to grasp the president's hand and give it a genuine American shake.
