A LARGE APPROPRIATION. Asked for to Erect a New Hospital for the Insane.

THE SUM OF \$250,000 REQUIRED. Captain Flannery introduces a bill in the House asking that a hospital be erected near Wilkes-Barre for the insane.

HARRISBURG, May 3.—Yesterday was a lively day in the senate and nearly every seat in the chamber was occupied while that body was called to order.

The appropriation for an act providing for the incorporation and regulation of savings banks and institutions without capital stock, established for the encouragement of saving money, was defeated—yeas 19, nays 11.

To prevent deception and fraud by owners or agents who may have control of any station kept for service, by publishing fraudulent or false pedigrees of records, and to protect such owners or agents in the collection of fees for service of such stations.

To prohibit members of boards of control of school districts, in cities of the second class, from holding any office of emolument under or being employed by said boards.

To amend section thirty-second of an act entitled "an act relating to roads, highways and bridges," approved June 13, 1893, providing for the mode of assessing damages created by carrying out the purposes of said act.

To protect county bridges from damage by persons riding or driving horses, cattle or other beasts of burden thereover faster than a walk.

Authorizing the courts of common pleas to appoint interpreters of foreign languages, and fixing the compensation of the said interpreters.

Senator Kilmer's bill to give the share of a deceased member in a limited partnership an equal share in the profits of the business was defeated.

The concurrent resolution providing for an investigation of the Warren hospital for the insane came up on a motion to refer it to the committee on judiciary general.

Senator McCarell said he had looked into the matter of Peart's charges against the hospital submitted a year ago and found that the governor had referred the charges to the board of public charities, which had attempted to investigate the same through the committee on lunacy, but were unable to get Peart to appear, even after the committee had agreed to pay the expenses.

Senator McCarell had no objection to an investigation, but he wanted it made clear that such an inquiry was necessary.

Senator Osburn was in favor of an investigation and he referred rather sarcastically to former alleged investigations of the committee on lunacy.

They Come to Grief After Landing on America Shores. NEW YORK, May 3.—Peter Zawacki, a Pole, came on from Pittston, Pa., yesterday and went to the office of George Grubbin, agent of the Polish Emigrant Society, at 10 Moore street, to get Grubbin's assistance in securing his children.

Several months ago he received letters from friends in Poland that his wife was receiving attentions from an old-time admirer, Zawacki sent her \$100 to bring the children over to their new home, when another letter was received saying Mrs. Zawacki and her lover, Jan Wosiewicz, had eloped with the children and gone to America.

The unfaithful couple arrived at Ellis Island from the Servia. They said they were brother and sister, and indignantly denied that they were elopers. They broke down and confessed yesterday when confronted by the woman's husband.

Mrs. Zawacki begged her husband to forgive her and take her back. He will probably do so for his children's sake. Nonetheless will probably be returned to Europe.
