**THE SCHUYLKILL GLASSIS.**

Now in Session at St. Paul's Church, Mahanoy City.

Special correspondence to HERALD.

**MAHANAY CITY, May 3.**—The annual session of the Schuylkill Classis was opened on Monday evening in St. Paul's Reformed church with religious services. The sermon was preached by Rev. Charles A. Leinbach, D. D., of Reading. It was an able one based on Matthew XXII; 24-29. After the services the Classis was organized and Rev. J. W. Steinmetz, of Reading, was elected president for the ensuing year. An adjournment was then taken.

Tuesday morning the session opened with religious services led by the president. After the reading and approval of minutes Rev. Steinmetz announced the appointments for the standing committees. Rev. H. Y. Stoner was elected corresponding secretary. The parochial reports read by the different pastors showed that the Reformed church grew and prospered very much during the past classical year. Rev. T. M. Yundt, superintendent of Bethany Orphans' Home, made an address stating the immediate want of the institution.

Special services were held Tuesday evening. Revs. S. R. Bridenbach and Robert O'Boyle conducted them. Rev. Henry Mosser, D. D., spoke on the condition of the Reformed church in this country previous to its separation from the Classis of Amsterdam. Rev. J. W. Steinmetz addressed the audience on the struggle of the church in this country during its early history. Rev. F. B. Hahn spoke on the history of our theological and literary institutions. Mr. J. P. Stein's address was on the mission of the Reformed church in this country.


