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A JUST REBUKE.

The Legislature did well when it rejected Representative Loech's proposition to reduce the salary of Dr. J. C. Biddle, the surgeon in chief and superintendent of the Miners' Hospital at Fountain Springs.

Dr. Biddle has never been abroad but once in all the years of his service in connection with the hospital and then for about twelve weeks in which he spent most of his time inspecting the medical institutions of Europe.

It is hoped Mr. Loech will soon acquire some good sense and abandon the bombastic tactics which have marked his brief career in the Legislature.

A Passenger Train Wrecked on the Big Four.

THE AIR BRAKES REFUSE TO WORK

Locomotive and Cars Thrown From the Track and Reduced to a Mass of Ruins—Passengers and Train Men Crushed to Death Beneath the Debris—Names of Those Killed in the Crash.

Lafayette, Ind., May 8.—The Big Four passenger train which left Chicago at 8:30 Saturday night in crossing the Washash river bridge here yesterday morning got away from the engineer. The air brakes would not work.

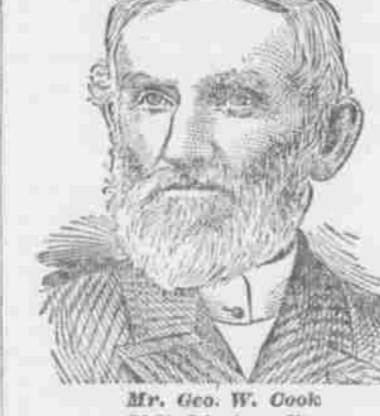
