ALL OF THE IMPORTANT EVENTS

The Grand Castle Knights of the Golden Eagle Meet in Lancaster.—The Driftor Mine Fire Under Control—New Business Enterprises Chartered—Other State Happenings.

LANCASTER, May 9.—The first of the exercises incident to the sixty-eighth annual commencement of the German Reformed Seminary was the baccalaureate sermon. It was preached by Rev. Dr. E. V. Gerhart, president of the seminary, and his theme was, "Ambassadors of the enthroned Christ." This evening there will be a reception given to the graduating class by President Gerhart and his wife. On Wednesday evening Rev. Dr. F. W. Gonsalves, president of Armour Institute, Chicago, will preach the annual sermon. The alumni reunion and banquet will be given on Thursday at noon, and in the afternoon at 3 o'clock ground will be broken for the new seminary building, with a special program of exercises. In the evening a class of twenty-three will be graduated.

Pennsylvania Asked for More Cash.
HARRISBURG, May 9.—The National World's Fair Commissioners from Pennsylvania, and the Executive Committee of the Pennsylvania Commission, at a meeting in Chicago, sent a telegram to Governor Pattison expressing the opinion "that an additional appropriation of at least \$50,000 is imperatively necessary in order to maintain the standing of the Commonwealth at the Exposition. The Fair, as a whole, cannot be finished earlier than June 1, in which time the additional appropriation, if granted immediately, can be used to advantage and give the State a representation commensurate with its importance."

Knights of the Golden Eagle Meet.
LANCASTER, May 9.—The Grand Castle Knights of the Golden Eagle met here today for a three-days session. There is already a large attendance of visiting castles and commanders. The parade of the order took place today and it is estimated that there were 6,000 knights in line. This afternoon the competition drill will take place. There will be a grand ball tendered the visiting members by the local lodge this evening.

Gettysburg's Commencement.
GETTYSBURG, May 9.—Gettysburg will hold its annual commencement this year Thursday, June 23. The theological seminary commencement will come off on June 9. A number of friends and alumni of the college whose homes are in this city will attend the commencement, remaining for several days. During their stay they will visit the famous battlefield.

Houses Infected by Lice.
LANCASTER, May 9.—Dr. S. T. Davis, President of the State Board of Health, was yesterday requested to quarantine lice-infected houses in West Earl township, the lice having spread to five houses, and driven three families out of their homes. The whole community is in a ferment of fear at the rapid spread of the pests.

The Fire Under Control.
HAZLETON, May 9.—The fire which broke out in No. 2 slope, at Drifton, Saturday, is now under control and will be extinguished without further loss to property. As it is, the timbers of the entire slope have been destroyed and are likely to cave in. The damage to that opening is estimated at \$7,000.

The Last Small-pox Flag Removed.
READING, May 9.—The last red flag in the city, indicating a case of small-pox, has been removed, and now there are no cases outside Joseph's hospital. The health authorities will maintain their vigilance to prevent another outbreak of the disease.

A Little Boy Drowned at Chester.
CHESTER, May 9.—Johnnie McCafferty, aged 15 years, his brother Eddie, and Johnnie Carr got into a boat and were paddling about Chester creek, when McCafferty lost his balance and fell into the creek and was drowned. His body was recovered.

Scarlet Fever Raging at Boyertown.
BOYERTOWN, May 9.—Scarlet fever is again quite prevalent here. Four children in the family of Charles Litchy are ill. One child is dead and two others are very low with the disease.

IT IS CONSTITUTIONAL.

Opinions Handed Down by Judge Simonton.

THE BOYER REVENUE ACT UPHELD

The Judge Orders that Judgments be Entered Against Four Corporations for Taxes Due the State—Exceedingly Short Work Made of the Constitutional Objections to the Act.

HARRISBURG, May 9.—In four opinions handed down yesterday by Judge Simonton at the opening of court he again sustained the constitutionality of the Boyer revenue law of 1891. At the beginning of the present year the state was flooded with circulars issued by the smaller trust companies in Philadelphia, setting forth that as the act of 1891 taxed the capital stock of corporations at 5 mills while other property was only taxed 4, the extra mill was unconstitutional, and stating that it had been asked to act as the custodian of a fund for the purpose of having the matter determined by the courts. Nearly every corporation of the State received such a circular and was asked to join in the movement. Some of the circulars also fell into the hands of State officials here.

A number of companies accepted the invitation of the trust company and appeals were accordingly entered, the companies paying four mills tax and appealing from the 5 mill mill. The companies against which judgments were entered were the Hafford, Rochester and Pittsburg Railroad Company, Johnsonburg and Bradford Railroad Company, Bristol Water Company, and Mill Creek Railroad Company, which were argued a short time ago by Mr. Newlin, of Philadelphia. Judge Simonton makes very short work of the constitutional objections, holding that, under the principles laid down in numerous decisions of the court and of the supreme court, classification may be made to a much greater length than necessary for the purpose of sustaining the tax in question in this case.

The taxation of the capital stock of these corporations at a different rate from the taxation of the personal property of individuals does not result in a want of uniformity forbidden by the constitution. While it is true that the capital stock of corporations represents their property it is not identical with it and cannot in any real sense be said to belong to the same class of subjects as the personal property of individuals.

He holds also that the act of 1891 does not conflict with any of the provisions of the constitution of the United States. Judgments are therefore directed to be entered against the four companies above named for the balance of taxes claimed by the state, with interest at 12 per cent. per annum and attorney general's commission of 5 per cent.

Supreme Court Opinions.

PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—The following orders and judgments were yesterday handed down by the supreme court:

Per curiam.—In Young vs. the court of common pleas of Lycoming county, the motion for re-argument was denied.

By Chief Justice Sterrett.—Judgments affirmed. Gates vs. the Pennsylvania Railroad Company, from the court of common pleas of Huntingdon county, and Volcan vs. Drum, from the court of common pleas of Luzerne county.

In Reilly's appeal, estate of Holnet, from the orphans' court of Blair county, the decree was reversed as to the amount of \$307.33 awarded to the heirs of the testatrix; and it was adjudged and decreed that this sum be paid to M. J. Reilly, the appellant, and that the costs of this appeal be paid by the appellees.

In Comings et al. vs. Davison, from the court of common pleas of Lackawanna county, the judgment was reversed and a prodecendo awarded.

In Fischer vs. the People's Street Railway Company, of Luzerne county, from the court of common pleas of Lackawanna county, the judgment was affirmed. Chief Justice Sterrett and Justice Dean dissented on the grounds that under the evidence this case should have been submitted to the jury.

In Simrell's appeal from the orphans court of Lackawanna county, the order of the court below was reversed and it was ordered and decreed that the paper writing purporting to be the last will and testament of Phoebe Ann Simrell, as it was in its original state before any of the erasures therein were made as her last will and testament and should be admitted to probate as such. All of the costs to be paid out of the estate of the testatrix. The record is remitted for further proceedings.

By Justice Dean.—In Mallelland's appeal, Meeker from the orphans' court of Centre county, the decree was reversed at the cost of the appellee and it was further ordered that the case may be proceeded with in accordance with the opinion filed.

By Justice Thompson.—Judgments reversed and new trials awarded: Harris vs. Harris, from the court of common pleas of Erie county, and Sweeney et al. vs. Girolo, from the court of common pleas of Clearfield county.

A Fatal Boating Accident.

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., May 9.—A row-boat was upset on Reed's lake, near this city, and its occupants, Cornelius Smallen-gage and Emma Rattmar, were thrown into the water. The woman was drowned and her companion was brought ashore but his recovery is doubtful.

The Cholera Continues to Spread.

PARIS, May 9.—The cholera keeps marching on towards Paris slowly and deliberately, but without halting. The Department of Finistere is admitted by the French to be infected, and every day brings reports of new cases in outlying towns and villages.

Over Half Are Italians.
