Buchanan to be Sentenced Thursday.
New York, May 9.—Dr. Robert W. Buchanan, who was recently convicted of poisoning his wife, was to have been called for sentence yesterday in part I. of the court of general sessions, but owing to the absence of Recorder Smyth the case went over. District Attorney Nicoll said he would probably be sentenced on Thursday. Mr. Brooke will move for a new trial on the ground that Juror Henry M. Paradise was rendered incapable of properly deliberating with his associates on account of illness.

Partridge Buys Short Wheat.
CHICAGO, May 9.—There was an enormous business done in wheat here yesterday at from 1-4 to 1-3-4c advance on Saturday's closing prices. Partridge took alarm at the strength of the news, both foreign and domestic, and took in short wheat by the wholesale. One estimate puts his day's purchase at from 5,000,000 to 6,000,000 bushels through his own house and other brokers.

Railroad Conductors Meet.
TOLSON, Ohio, May 9.—The convention of the Order of Railroad Conductors of America will be in session here all this week. Some 600 delegates are expected, besides 150 ladies of the auxiliary organization. The opening meeting was held at the People's theatre this morning, at which Governor McKinley welcomed the conductors on the part of the state.

Railroaders Meet at Easton.
EASTON, May 9.—The annual meeting of the federation board of organizations of the New Jersey Central railroad was held here yesterday. The delegation represented members in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. Eugene Mahoney, of Jersey City, of division No. 157, Locomotive Engineers, was elected general chairman of the board, vice M. N. Clapp, resigned.

The Stock Market Was Uneasy.
New York, May 9.—The stock market was feverish and unsettled in the early hours of business yesterday. The absence of failures finally turned the current of stock prices upward, and during the afternoon a better feeling prevailed than at any previous time for a week or more. Speculation closed strong to buoyant in tone.

A Large Mill Burned.
PHILADELPHIA, May 9.—The large four-story mill at Orchard and Tacony streets was burned last night, with a loss of \$200,000.

DECORATION DAY.

Stirring Address of Department Commander Sample.
COMRADES—Another year has passed and we are again reminded the time is approaching when we make our annual visitation to the habitations of the dead. More than twenty-eight years have passed since the Angel of Peace spread her wings over our beloved country. In all that time you have never faltered in your devotion to the memory of your departed comrades, and now in the midst of this beautiful season of the year, when all nature is bright, and the sweet perfume of the flowers of spring is around and about us, it were well that we stop at the milestones of 1865, and with solemn thoughts and utterance renew our allegiance to the cause for which so many of our brave comrades went down to their death, or since the eventful days of the war have dropped by the wayside. Let us show by our zeal in the performance of this sacred duty, that we believe it is well for the country to thus honor her defenders, and in this manner teach an object lesson of patriotism which will never be forgotten. For our comrades who have answered the last roll call there are in our hearts words, if we could speak them, that are as Passion flowers, and sentences that are as wreaths of Amaranth. They sleep under the dew and the daisy. To their memory, on May 30th, we will drop the tribute of a tear, and on the lowly mounds scattered throughout our great Commonwealth let us plant the beautiful flowers of spring time, that will be watered with the tears of the people of a grateful country. As we bend o'er the graves of our comrades, we can recall, as if in sweet communion, their noble, unselfish sacrifices and heroic bearing in the hour of danger, for humanity and civilization. In this spirit of meditation we look about us and see the evidence of prosperity over this broad land, and whilst we can recall nothing that can arouse a feeling of vindictiveness or sectional passion, we feel proud of the fact that our honored dead were comrades in the grandest volunteer army the world ever knew.
