Robbers Plunder a Store and Then Burn It at Red Hill, Chester County-West Chester Visited by a Disastrous Biaze-An Altoona Firm Goes to the Wall-Other State Happenings.

NORRISTOWN, May 11.-Word was re-Normations, May 11.—Word was received at police headquarters yesterday of
a case of robbery and probably incendiarism
at Red Hill, in Chester county, about three
miles from Spring City. Addison Miller
conducted a general grocery store at Red
Hill, and in the basement of the establishment was a creamery. About midnight
Tuesday night the building was found to
be in flames, and in an hour the store and
creamery with their contents were in askes. treamery with their contents were in ashes, involving a loss of \$4,000 on building and \$2,500 on stock.

Subsequently it was discovered that a horse and Dearborn wagon, the property of Frank Miller, a brother of the creamery man, were missing. Yesterday an abandoned team was found tied to a tree near the Pennsylvania Railroad Company's Franklin avenue station, in this berough. When Mr. Miller came to Norristown to report the affair he was shown the team, and at once identified it as that stolen from his stable. A butter tub and several articles in the wagon were also identified as part of in the wagon were also identified as part of the proceeds of the robbery of the store. How much plunder the thieves obtained cannot be estimated, as the flames wiped out all the evidence of the robbery except that left by the recovery of the horse and waren.

Property Burned at West Chester, West Chestra, May 11.—The \$500,000 plant of the West Chester Cold Storage Company was only saved from destruction Company was only saved from destruction by the most valiant work at the hands of the volunteer fire department. The plant cousists of three buildings, all connected, the main building, in which is all the valu-able machinery for the manufacture of ice, the engine house, and the storage building. The fire was first discovered in the latter structure, having originated from the wires of the electric light, with which the building is illuminated.

The storage house was entirely destroyed, together with 700 tons of ice which it contained. The ice is valued at \$5 a ton, and the building was worth \$3,500. It was the most disastrous fire West Chester has had for twenty-five years.

Attorney Drawry, of Norfolk, Va., who is now under arrest there for the part he has played in swinding Uncle Sam, refuses to talk in regard

to the matter. When the frauds were first discovered it was thought that about 90 per cent of the pensions procured by Drewry had been gotten through the pension office through false certificates, but it now transpires upon further investigation that fully 95 cent, of the pension business done by him was fraudulent, and it may foot up still more than this when the returns are all in. A thorough investigation of the whole af-fair is to be made at once.

There's Free Gold in the Treasury. Washinston, May 11.—Secretary Car-lisle has received and accepted the offer of the St. Leals backs to supply the government with \$2,200,000 of gold. 
