An Electric Suggestion.
EDITOR HERALD—I wish to call the attention of the Shenandoah Traction Company to the fact that under its present schedule for running cars it is causing the public much inconvenience and embarrassment and is losing money. Without any public notice the company has changed its schedule so that the last car leaves the east end of Girardville at 10:30 p. m. During the past few nights large numbers of patrons of the road visiting that town were sorely vexed to find that they were left behind. Through the kindness of some of the motor men extra trips were made and these people were relieved from the very unpleasant alternative of remaining in Girardville all night or walking to Shenandoah. Last Monday evening over thirty people of the latter town were left behind and on another evening a large number of ladies who attended a surprise party at Girardville met with the same fate. If the company does not abandon its present system it will make a big mistake and lose considerable money. Why, last summer, when the electric road was in a primitive condition, much of its earnings was derived from the people who took rides down the valley and back again at late hours in the evening. The pleasure parties left this town at eight and nine o'clock at night and the cars were crowded on the return trips even until one and two a. m. It may not seem proper that people should seek pleasure at such hours, but that makes no difference to the railway company. It is looking for patronage and money. I hope the Traction people will look into this matter carefully. They will find that 11 p. m. is early enough for the last car to leave Girardville.

BOILERS EXPLODE.

Two Take Flight at the Lawrence Colliery.

At about two o'clock this morning two boilers exploded at the Lawrence colliery, Mahanoy Plane, operated by Burchill & Moore, but fortunately no one was injured and the damage done was not extensive. No cause is assigned for the explosion.

The boilers went through the east end of the west boiler house and plunged into the ground immediately outside the building. Five other boilers were displaced and the stables nearby were set on fire, but the flames were extinguished before much damage was done.

The pumps of the colliery were started again this afternoon and all the boilers will be in place and ready by Thursday, next, when it is expected the colliery will resume operations. It has been idle several days on account of the water gaining on the pumps.
