He quoted from the Bible to show that there is no warrant in divine law for taking a man's life, because the Lord bath said "Vengeance Is mine," and "who so sheddeth man's blood by man shall his blood be shed." Senator McCarreil made an eloquent and convincing speech against the bill. He quoted from the lible to prove his assertion that there is warrant in the divine law for the inflic tion of capital punishment. Even in the civil code was the taking of life instifled, when it was provided that killing in self-defense is no orime. He discussed the phases of marder, and for helf an hear held the rapt attention of the senators by his argument in defense of the present system. Senater Baker was in favor of the bill, and spoke of the brutalizing effects of hanging on the public mind. After some further discussion the bill was defeated—20 is 20, tays 27.

The senate concurred in the house amendments to the Broadhead Water company bill, providing that owners of land shall have free ingress and egress to such

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
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
