Work Done by the Legislators at Harrisburg.

THE BILLS REPORTED AND PASSED

The Senate Defeats the Bill Providing for the Licensing of Unnaturalized Male Cir. Izens-Mr. O'Kell Takes the Oath o Office-The Riter Pure Water Bill Passe Second Rending.

Among the bills passed finally in the senate were the following:

Placing a tax of not more than \$2 or male and \$4 on female dogs.

Amending the act to create a banking department, fixing the qualifications of the superintendent and deputy superintendent, providing for the appointment of a deputy superintendent, examiners, clerks and stenographer, regulating their compensation, specifying the conditions and amounts of bonds to be given by the superintendent, the deputy superintendent and examiners

and defining their powers and duties.

Authorizing the superintendent of public instruction with the approval of the governor, to employ or aid in the employment of lecturers or instructors to attend the summer assemblies of associations incor-porated for the promotion of education and popular culture, and providing for the pay ment of such lecturers or instructors.

House bill for the preservation of the records in the county offices in the com-monwealth, and for the punishment of county officers for neglect of duty in con-

nection therewith. House bill defining to whom the benefit certificates issued by fraternal societies, paying benefits upon the death of their members, by mutual assessment, where the person or member dies without leaving a person designated to receive the same.

The bill providing for the licensing of unnaturalized male persons, 21 years of age or over, who reside or are employed within this commonwealth, was defeated. 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
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
