### PRESIDENT MLEOD RESIGNS.

He Terminates His Connection with the Boston & Maine.

Boston, May 24.—At the meeting of the Boston & Maine road yesterday President McLeod's letter of resignation was presented.

In it he says he accepted the office of president representing the interest of the Reading railroad.

He says he contemplated traffic arrangements between the two companies which would be mutually advantageous; but since he was no longer officially connected with the Reading Railroad Company and the Reading has parted with its holdings of Boston & Maine stock, it would be impossible for him to carry out his plans.

The Hon. Frank Jones will be re-elected president at the next meeting of the board.

**MUST CARRY THEM IF RECEIVED.**

But the Railroad Cannot be Compelled to Receive Goods for Transport.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—Assistant Secretary Hamlin has decided a new point as to the power of the Treasury Department to compel a railroad company to receive and carry goods received at the seaboard and destined for interior ports under the Immediate Transportation act.

He holds that when a railroad company receives such goods it must transport them, but no power is vested in the Treasury Department or its officers to compel the railroad company or common carrier to receive them. In making this decision he overrules the Collector of Customs at Philadelphia.

Mr. Hamlin does not touch upon the point of the right of the importer to compel the railroad company under a common carrier law to receive and transport his goods.

### THE CASE OF DR. BRIGGS

Recommended that the Appeal be Entertained.

REPORT OF JUDICIAL COMMITTEE

A Majority and Minority Finding Presented—The Former Recommends that After Due Discussion the Assembly Vote Upon a Resolution that the Case Proceed to Trial—The Minority Report.

WASHINGTON, May 24.—The Judicial Committee of the Presbyterian General Assembly, in its report on the Briggs case, recommended that the appeal from the decision of the New York Presbytery be entertained.

The special order for 2:30 o'clock yesterday, the hour of meeting, was the report of the judicial committee on the Briggs case. Immediately after the opening prayer, Dr. Baker, chairman, was recognized, and addressed the Moderator and Assembly as follows:

"I had earnestly hoped that but one report would be presented by our committee. But in this I have been disappointed. I presume the failure was inevitable. I take, however, comfort in the thought that there is something better than even unanimity, and that something is fidelity to conscience. It is fidelity to conscience which has compelled the majority report, and it is fidelity to conscience that has compelled the minority report. While we speak the truth with all boldness, let us speak it ever in love; and shall we not all resolve that whatever be the decision, and God only knows what that decision is to be, we will, as loyal Presbyterians, abide faithfully by that decision? Let us resolve that we will sternerly from upon and utterly discountenance any suggestion from whatever quarter it may come of schism or division in our dear church. Recalling our ordination vows, let us submit ourselves to one another in the Lord, loyally abiding the decision which shall be reached by our constitutional methods.

"In the case of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America against the Rev. Charles A. Briggs, D. D., being an appeal to the General Assembly from the decision and final judgment of the Presbytery of New York, rendered January 9, 1892, the judicial committee begs leave respectfully to report that they find:

"1.—That the appellant in this case is the Presbyterian Church, in the United States of America, represented by the Presbytery of New York, and as such is entitled to conduct the prosecution until the final issue be reached.

"2.—That the appeal and specifications of error alleged have been filed in due time.

"3.—That they therefore submit resolutions: That the appeal be entertained. That three hours be allotted for such hearing, viz., one and one half hours to each party, and after hearing from the members of the Assembly, three hours being allotted for such hearing, the Assembly shall then vote upon the following resolutions:

"Resolved, That the appeal from the decision and final judgment of the Presbytery of New York, rendered January 9, 1892, be entertained; and it is ordered that the case proceed to trial in accordance with the provisions of the Book of Discipline.

The report is signed by the following members of the committee: George D. Baker, chairman; John T. Duffield, John S. Hayes, James T. Leitch, James M. Maxwell, D. J. Sanders, John Peacock, J. S. Baidwin, Edward T. Green, Thomas McDougall, Cyrus L. Preshing, William Fulton, George W. Cummings, H. M. Graydon and James L. Orr.

The minority report is as follows:

"We find the appeal in order, and we respectfully recommend to the General Assembly that the parties be heard in accordance with the Book of Discipline, section 49."

The Hamilton Electric Railway.
