WHO KILLED THEM ?

The New York Evening World says there are certain points in the mysterious case of the escaped convicts Rohle and Pallister, which certainly claim the attention of the police and are sufficiently clear to demand an investigation and to warrant the offer of a reward by the state.

Both men were shot before being thrown into the river. The wounds of both were made by bullets of thirtyeight calibre, such as are in general use in the prison.

Pallister's revolver, thirty-eight calibre, was fully loaded. Not a chamber has been discharged.

Rohie's pistol, taken from Guard Hulse, is now said to have been of forty-four callbre. If so, it could not have inflicted the wounds found on the men.

Roble's injuries were such that they could not have been self-inflicted. Some other person or persons than the escaped convicts must have done the killing.

The story of three men being in the boat is so improbable as to seem ridicul lous. It would scarcely have been possible for one man to have killed two armed and desperate men in a small boat on the river during a storm.

Were Rohle and Pallister ever in the boat at all? Were they killed while preparing to get into the boat by somebody in ambush, their bodies thrown into the river and the boat sent adrift. to cover up the tracks?

Who had an interest in putting the men out of the way? Who knows what money they had with them? Who, except themselves and the bribed men, knows whether bribery secured their escape? If they had been recaptured they might have told 1 the truth. But some one else, some person outside the prison, must have been in their confidence. Cannot such person be found?

The killing of the men, although they were escaped convicts, was murder. Should not some effort be made to ferret out such a crime?

OUR BUSY LAWMAKERS. Work Done by the Legislators at Harrisburg.

PROCEEDINGS IN BOTH BRANCHES.

The Judiciary Local Committee Makes But Two Changes in the Salary Bill-Governor Pattison Approves the Pen rose Measure-A Long List of Appropriation Bills Passed.

HARRISTURG, May 25 --- Yesterday's proreedings in the legislature were not of a particularly enthusiastic nature, the great er portion of the day being devoted to appropriation bills.

The first incident of the proceedings was a "call of the senate," less than a quorum voting on the first bill to authorize church corporations owning burial grounds to purchase other grounds and to well and convey such portions of their lands not

used or conveyed by them for burial pur poses, or which may have been re-conveyed to them. Subsequently the bill passed and the senators managed to remain in their scats or in the vicinity thereof until ad-

The salary bill as amended Tuesday was e-committed to the judiciary local com mittee for amendment. There were but two changes-one making the corporation deputy attorney general's department deputy attorney general at a salary of \$3,000, increase \$500, and one of the ten cierks chief bookneeper at a salary of \$1,800, increase \$400.

Governor Fattison notified the senate that he had approved the Penrose bill abolishing the public building commission in Philadelphia.

"God Save the Queen" was played in gach of the buildings controlled by Her Majesty's sciblects, and the day was given over to festivities by all loyal Britishers. It was all in celebration of Queen Vic-toria's birthday.

toria's birthday. The event was formally terminated at a banquet at the Virzinia Hotel last evening given by the World's Fair commissioners of Great Britain and her colonies to 150 rominent British subjects and residents i Chicago.

The Canadian World's Fair representa tives held a reception at their pavillon dur-ing the day. There were toasts and responses and music and refreshments, and the affair was most delightful.

The German section in the Agricultural building was formally opened yesterday by Imperial Commissioner Wermuth. A number of prominent German-Americans, German exhibitors and World's Fair offi-cials were present. After the opening an elaborate luncheon was served at the German village.

The Theodore Thomas question may be considered practically settled, and as a re-sult Mr. Thomas will remain in charge of his department with his powers of control alightly curtailed to satisfy the monibers of the National Commission who were clamoring for his dismissial. The result was arrived at at a stormy meeting of the Board of Reference and Control.

Immediately after the National commis-sion assembled yesterday Commissioner Massey arose and tendered his resignation as a member of the Judiciory committee. In giving his reason for resigning he said that the commission had not adopted a single majority report of any importance submitted to it by the committee since he had been a member. The only logical conclusion was that the commission lacked confidence in the integrity and ability of the committee. As chairman of the committee, he felt bound to resign. He had not acted instilly. He had consid-ered the matter carefully, and no amount of persuasion could induce him to continue as a member of the committee.

Commissioner Massey has taken a lead-ing part in the fight to keep the gates closed Sunday. A majority report from his committee in favor of Sunday closing failed of adoption by the Na-tional Commission tional Commission.

Persons who deliberately appeal to passions and prejudices in times of intense feeling and do all in their power to fan the flames of excitement take a grave responsibility in their hands. All the same, if Gladstone had been slain, home rule would have received its most powerful impetus to a successful conclusion. Always the blood of the martyrs is the seed of sure success for any cause.

THE New York Herald says that there has been a shrinkage of not less than \$500,000,000 in the value of stocks in this country since the 1st of January. 
