Captain Blunt is Completely Exonerated.

CHARGES AGAINST HIM UNFOUNDED.

Colonel Otis' Report Declares that the Acensed Captain Did Not Discriminate Against American Inventors-Instructions from the War Department Faith fully Fulfilled.

WARRINGTON, May 26.—Secretary La mont has received a report from Colonel E. S. Otis, Twentieth infantry, president of the small arms board, in regard to the charges made by Mr. Durst and other American inventors against Captain S. E. Blunt, ordnance department, recorder of the board.

The substance of these charges is that Captain Blunt was biased in favor of the Kraig-Jorgensen gun and that he practi-cally prevented fair competition on the part of the American Inventors. Colonel Otis' report is a lengthy document covering in detail with evidence every point charged against Captain Blunt. It completely exmerates him from every charge, and rep resents that instead of discouraging American inventors he fulfilled to the latter every instruction from the war department and put himself out to give American in ventors every possible facility.

Spaulding Not Worried.

Washingron, May 26.—Assistant Secre-tary Spaulding says that he is not in the least concerned about the attempt to associate him with the charges being investi-gated in the appraiser's office, New York He says he does not propose to say any-thing about it or to pay any attention whatever to the matter unless he is called upon by the commission fer information. Everything that he has done, he says, is in black and white and of official record. It the commission calls on him for any information he is willing to go to them in New York or farnish them information in any way they desire, and the records of the department are open to them. 
