They turned into Centre street and ran-towards Chambers street, the dog snap-ping at everybody who came in his way a. causing panic among passers by. At City Hall place the animal turned sudden-ly and bit young Smith in the leg. Then a street sweeper knocked the dog over with his brown and before it; can'ld yet away his broom, and before it could get away again a policeman shot it to death. A large crowd had gathered and there was itense excitement.
The boys were taken to their homes and

their wounds were canterized. The wounds are serious and the physicians fear that hydrophobia may result from them. People along the strest traversed by the maddened terrier were terror stricken and several people were severely bruised while trying to escape being bitten.

Michael Davitt Bankruptcy Proceedings.

STAGE OF THE HOME RULE BILL

Excitement About the Young Cancha in Austria Increasing-The Behring Sea Case-Two Russian Princes' Fatal Duel Other News of Interest.

DUBLIN, June 3 .- Michael Davitt, late P., for Northeast Cork, was exunited yesterday in the bankruptcy pro ceedings instituted because he has been unable to pay the costs of the North Meath election contest, which resulted in his being unseated. Mr. Davitt stated that he had objected to the project for a public subscription to help him out of his secuniary difficulties. Among his assets is a debt of £400 due

to him by the Gaelic Athletic Association the debt having been paid by Mr. Davitt to save the members of the association from arrest for non-payment of a hotel bill in Philadelphia. The association had promised Patrick Ford that they would repay the bill, but had falled to do so.

Mr. Davitt denied having rushed into bankruptcy in order to hasten his return to Parliament. The court has decided that Land Leagues Cottage Englishment.

IN THE COMMONS.

Still Debating the Home Rule Bill-Irish Members Complain. London, June 3 .- In the debate on an mendment offered by Mr. E. W. Byrne, Conservat ve Member of Parliament for Southwest Essex, the Irish member showed for the first time, that they thought the government was conceding too much without consulting them. Mr.

Byrne's amendment was intended to prevent the Iriah legislature from enacting laws in respect to the use of arms by armed associations for drilling purposes. The Right Hon. Joseph Chamberlain said that to permit such use would be tentamount to permitting the formation of armed forces which might be improperly used. Chief Secretary Morley said that the government would accept an amend-ment debarring the Irish legislature from permitting the use of arms for military

nurposes.

Here Mr. Thomas Sexton, Nationalist
Member of Parliatment for North Kerry,
interp sed. He spoke in opposition to the
proposed amendment, and expressed the
opinion that in regard to such an amendment, as also the amendment of the previous evening, forbelding the organization of a national constabulary under Irish au thority, representative Irish opinion ought to be allowed to speak before the government replied.

DOUBLY FATAL DUEL Two Russian Princes Engage in a Quar-

rel and Fight to the Death. St. Persassuno, June 3.—A despatch has been received bringing news of a duel with tragic results in the province of Poltava. Prince Bargram and Prince Mustapha, members of the leading families of Daghestan, a government of Russia in the Caucasus, started together for Moscow to solicit the C.ar for permission to enter the Imperial Guard. While on their journey,

having got as far as Barva, in the govern ment of Poitava, they quarrelled.

The dispute became so bitter that they fought a deadly duel, Prince Bargrum being fatally stabbed and Prince Mustapha fatally shot with a revolver. The police authorities at Barva sent the corpses back to Tifflis, to be delivered to the families

of the dead. YOUNG CZECHS PROTEST,

Will Petition the Emperor to Continue the Assembly at Prague. PRAGUE, June 8 .- The young Czechs are deeply agitated over the decision of the Austrian Emperor to close the Assembly at Prague, in consequence of the recent outrageous disorders on the part of the young Czech members of that body, which compelled Prince Lobkowitz, President of the Diet, to bring the session to

an end. One thousand young Czechs have there-fore met at Podebad, in Bohemia, and re-

solved to send a large deputation to Em-peror Francis Joseph, to beg him to con-tinue the Assembly at Prague. The excitement over the antagonism on the part of the Young Czechs toward the Germans continues. The Young Czechs have decided to withdraw from the Diet, and it is reported that if the present ex-citement and disorder continue a state of siege will be proclaimed by the Austrian authorities. A Czech newspaper has been

suppressed on account of its seditions tone S:ill Talking About the Scals. Panis, June 3.—Sir Richard Webster continuing his argument before the Behring Sea Tribunal of Arbitration in behalf of the British case, slyly chaffed Mr. J. C. Carter, of counsel for the United States, on his theories of property and its origin. American law, Sir Richard said, did not claim any property whatever in the seals and there was not a vestige of authority fo treating the scals as domestic animals.


