Don't Waste.


A penny saved is a penny carned. There is no need of wasting, as is usually done, a good sized piece of gimp or any trimming that ravels in the cutting. Measure off the amount required for the collar or sleeves, or whatever when near enough to the seam to insure making no mistake by allowing too much or too little. Allow, then, just enough to turn in the raw edge, put a pin in, and on each side of the pin tightly twist a few strands of strong thread or silk of the same color as the trimming. Then fasten the ends of the thread, carefully withdraw the pin and cut the trimming. Not only does thus winding prevent any waste, but it also prevents the loose ends working out from where they are turned

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
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
