

As presi-dent of the State board of agriculture, the governor is empowered to appoint the dairy and food commissioner. It is claimed by the state administration that under the provisions of the new act relating to the employment and safety of women and children in manufacturing establishments, and the appointment of inspectors to enforce the same, the governor has the right to appoint a factory inspector at once, and he re-appointed Robert Watchorn, who was rejected by the senate, and over whom the senate and governor had some trouble. 


