THE BORDEN TRIAL. Court Room Again Crowded With Women Today—Yesterday's Proceedings.

NEW LONDON, Mass., June 13.—As on yesterday, the court room was filled long before the opening of the trial this morning, and again the majority of the spectators were women.

Shortly before court opened yesterday counsel on both sides were summoned into the private room of the presiding justice for consultation. Miss Borden came into court at 8:30, and took her seat within the bar, looking somewhat drugged, and in answer to an inquiry from Gov. Robinson as to her rest last night, her words and manner indicated that she did not pass a pleasant night. The consultation lasted twenty minutes.

After the court was opened and the jury polled, the officers were directed by the court to remove the jury until they were sent for pending the arguments to follow.
