THE BORDEN TRIAL

Court Boom Again Crowded With Womer Toolay-Yesterday's Proceedings.

NEW PERSONN, Mass., June 13 - As on vesterday, the court room was filled long before the opening of the trial this morning, and again the majority of the specta-LOPS WETO WODDER.

Shortly before court opened vesterday ounsel on both sides were summoned into the private room of the presiding justices for consultation. Miss Bordan came into court at 8:50, and took her seat within the bar, looking somewhat draggled, and in answer to an inquiry from Gov. Robinson as to her rest last night, her words and manner indicated that she did not pass a pleasant night. The consultation lasted twenty minutak.

As was to have been expected, there is to be an investigation of the Ford theatre disaster, an investigation that should have been made long ago. Had that been done, the terrible calamity would no doubt have been averted. It will be of little avail now, except to give a clear idea of the inexcusable disregard on the part of the Government officers whose duty it was to have made careful investigation. What renders this neglect or indifference, or whatever may be its proper designation, wholly without defense, is the clearly established fact that the insecurity of the building was well known.

THE state board of health has sent

out a circular from its office in the internal affairs building to prepare the people on a possible invasion of cholera. A supervising inspector will be appointed in each county to watch the railroads, especially immigrant trains, to examine the sanitary coudition of the towns and cities, and the character and source of water supplies.
