



THEY SANK TOGETHER.

Rev. Father McKenna and His Cousin Drowned.

SAD ENDING OF A PLEASURE TRIP.

The Death Grasp of the Woman He Was Trying to Rescue Causes Both to Die in the Waters of the Rudson - The Drawned Woman a Bride of Two Months Both of the Bodies Recovered.

New York, June 17.-Rev. C. P. Me-Kenna, a priest attached to St. Ann's thurch, in East Twelfth street, and Mrs. Mary Burchell, his cousin, whose home was in Pittsburg, Pa., were drowned in the Hudson at the foot of West One Hundred and First street.

It was at the end of a day's pleasure. They had been rowing and had returned to

the Bloomingdale Boat Club house.

Mrs. Burchell had left the boat and stood upon the float. She dropped a glove and in stooping to recover it stepped upon and in stooping to recover it stepped upon the boat's gunwale. The boat tipped and Father McKenna and Mrs. Burchell were thrown into the water. The priest swam to save the woman. She seized him and they sank together, re-appearing 100 feet away as the ebb carried them out.

Help came a moment later, but it was too late them. The priest's strength had been overtaxed. They sank together.

Mrs. Burchell was married only two months ago to Charles Burchell, of Pittsburg. She came to this city ten days age to visit the father of the man who died in

The priest's father, Hugh McKenna, lives in the Bouleard, between One Hundred and Twentieth ad One Hundred and Twenty-first streets. The young priest borrowed a boat from his young priest borrowed a boat from his younger brother to give Mrs. Burchell a row on the Hudson. They started at 2 o'clock from the float of the Blooming dale boat club, at the foot of One Hundred and First street. They reached the club house again at 5.
