CHEAP FAIR TRAINS SOON

So Says Dr. Depew of the New York Central.

THEY ARE TO BEGIN ABOUT JULY 15

Awaiting the Decision of the Traffic Asortation Committee-How Some Pecple Will Travel and Save Money-All Roads Getting Ready for the Expected

New York, June 23 - The report of the executive committee of the Central Traffic Association on the matter of cheap excursion rates to Chicago has not yet been made. A favorable report is, however,

Chaunesy M. Depew, president of the New York Central & Hudson River railroad, in speaking of this new move of the Association, spoke very interestedly of World's Fair traffic-

"While undoubtelly a World's Fair rush has set in, it is all from places within radius of about 300 miles of Chicago, People from that distance or within twelve hours' ride are pouring to Chicago, and H is this rush that makes up the attendance at the Fair at present. What you might call the popular crowd has not started yet, and will not for a month. By the popular erowd, I mean people from all over the country; people from great distances. Now, take the figures for the month of May for New York. The entire number of persons carried to Chicago was only 18,000, and this was by eight lines, so you

ee that it is not much of an increase The people who are going to Chicago low are those who can afford to pay for accommodations on the fast trains. twenty and twenty-tour hour trains have palatial accommodations and only we diliy cople feel that they can afford to pay the

Price.
"But at the last meeting of the Trunk lines I proposed putting on cheap trains and it met with considerable favor. We and it met with consciences swot. We shall put these trains on about July 15, and then we may expect to see the rush. During July, Angust and September, I expect the rush will be so great as to tax the uttermost facilities of the railronds. The great mass of the people do not begin to take their vacation until well into July, so that is another reason for the backward

tess of the rush. "I expect that the cheap trains will do an enormous business, and this is the way I calculate. In the first place, it will be an impossibility to provide enough sleeping cars be half of the people making the trip, and then a great many will argue this way. Here is a fast train going through in twenty to twenty-four hours, on which the fare is \$25, and \$4 for a sleeper. That makes a total of \$29. Now I can take a slower train, which takes perhaps six bours longer, and pay \$50.
