MONEY MARKET EASIER.

The Worst of the Credit Panic Believed to be Over.

AGLEAM OF HOPE FOR WALL STREET

The Prospects of the Report of the Sherman Law When Congress Meets, Said to Give a Great Deal of Strength to the Financial Situation—Less Currency Being Shipped Abroad.

NEW YORK, June 26.—There is a growing assurance in the public mind that the Sherman law will be repealed as soon as Congress meets and the growth of this conviction begins to be reflected in a subsidence of the credit panic at various interior centres and Wall street begins to see a rift here and there in the clouds which so long have hovered over that interesting locality. The increased export of wheat and the purchase of options on that cereal for foreign export, co-operating with the high rates of money here, has depressed the sterling exchange to such a level that there is an apprehension of further exports and the approach of the season in which the precious metal ordinarily flows here from Europe encourages hopes of an influx at no distant day. The engagement of \$500,000 worth of gold bonds from London on a special transaction, and over-shipment of people who fancied that it was the beginning of a sustained movement in this direction were sadly disappointed.

However, it is positive that the influx of the precious metal from this country is over, at any rate, and there is every indication that the flow of currency westward has been curtailed.
