## JUSTICE BLATCHFORD.

The Eminent Jurist's Sufferings Relieved by Death.

CONSCIOUS ALMOST TO THE END.

The Body Will Probably be Taken to the National Capital-Forty Years on the Judicial Bench and for Eleven Years a Supreme Court Judge.

Newront, R. I., July 8.—Associate Jus-tice Samuel Blatchford, of the United States supreme court, passed quietly and peacefully from earth at 7:30 last evening. He retained consciousness until an hour of two before his death. There was no audden change in his condition, simply the grad-nal allpping away which has been taking place for the last week. The arrangements for the funeral are not yet completed, but the body will probably be taken to Wash-ington for Interment. For many reasons he has been a quiet visitor in the city dur ing the summer season, residing in his own cottage on Greenough place, and while not greatly given to society followngs, he was frequently entertained in the

first families.
Samuel Blatchford was born in New York city March 9, 1820. He was the son of Richard Milford Blatchford, a distinguished lawyer of his time. He studied in the public schools of the city, and was graduated from college in the class of 1837. In '89 he became the private secre-tary of Governor Seward, and held the potary of Governor Seward, and held the po-sition until he was admitted to the bar in 1842. He began the practice of law in New York city, but removed three years later to Auburn, where he became the law part-ner of Governor Seward. In 1852 Justice Blatchford began the publication of de-cisions of the United States circuit court, Two years later he returned to New York, where he practiced law until he was ele-vated to the federal bench.

In 1867 President Johnson made him United States district judge for the South-ern district of New York, in which post-tion he served with distinguished success until 1878. In that year President Hayes appointed him circuit judge for the Second indicial district, and in 1882 he was again promoted to be an associate justice of the United States supreme court, to succeed E. Hunt, by President Harrison. He was regarded as the highest authority in the United States upon questions arising in admiralty law.

Judge Blatchford's long experience as judge of the Southern district of New York had made him intimately familiar with that difficult branch of the law, and many of the most important decisions in admiralty cases rendered by the United States supreme court in the last twenty years were written by him. Judge Blatchford in personal appearance

was notable. He had an erect and sturdy carriage, a vigorous constitution, and was fond of open air exercise. Although he passed the age of retirement in 1800, he was so vigorous both in body and mind that he refused to surrender his life work. He was fond of society, and entertained handsomely at his home in Washington.

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
