### OBSE'S OBSERVATIONS.

What He Sees and Hears During His Travels.

At its last meeting the Borough Council discussed more matters of direct interest to the borough than have received its attention at any one meeting for some time past.

The complaints about bad streets and defective sanitary arrangements lured upon them as a flood. They were almost too numerous to be followed by the committee who must look after them. It is quite apparent that the people want a clean and well regulated town this year, and it is also evident that Council proposes giving it to them, for all the complaints made were promptly acted upon.

The School Board will meet to elect teachers for the 1897-8 term next Wednesday evening. The election will also include the selection of a principal to succeed Prof. William N. Kibbort, resigned.

It is hoped President Bettridge will name the members of the Board of Health at the next meeting of Council so that they may get down to work. Their services are badly needed. Many of the residents of this town have not been aware of the fact that they have been using adulterated milk for considerable time. The use of such milk, if prolonged, may be the cause of producing an epidemic of sickness, and for this reason the Board of Health will be asked to take some steps to punish the parties who are responsible for putting it on sale. Several parties having complained that the milk they have purchased from farmers coming over from the Catawissa Valley has turned out to be a worst kind of adulterated mixture, not withstanding the farmers warranted it as the very best grade of cream. Another thing the Board will be expected to turn its attention to is the sale of dancing fruit. This is one of the greatest evils of the summer season and as soon as they are appointed the health officers should give it their attention.

There is one advantage the Chinese have over the white man, and that is that they can keep their mouths shut. What "John" is going to do or not going to do you never can find out from him. This reticence is assumed probably for self protection, but it pervades the Chinaman in America from the laundryman to the highest official. You may pull "John's" queue, you may swear at him, you may smash his wash house windows in, yet over a word he answers back. He stretches his lips tight across his mouth and endures in wooden silence. He may meditate revenge; he probably does; but it will be taken in a way and time that his tormentors are not expecting. He broods and bides his time. Even if you try to converse with him in his laundry, on Main street, he will pretend not to understand, and his language is confined to the vocabulary of shirts and the price you pay. That he knows perfectly, he is a watchful, suspicious Sphinx carved in ivory. Even Chen the Lens, accused of being a government spy commissioned by the Emperor to study the status of his countrymen in America and report on American public opinion toward them, answers nothing when asked if this is the case.

The reporter who wrote up the accident that happened to our worthy townsman, F. J. Portz, on the Fourth of July, made a slight mistake. Mr. Portz's hand was not burned by fire crackers, but by a unusual explosion of a Roman candle. The whole charge of a
