A rescuing party successed in getting but two of the men, Monus and Sycoksi, before they were overcome by fire damp.

The most important change, in addition to what has already appeared in these column was the manuer in which state and nationa delogates should be chosen. The new rule rends as follows:

"All delegates to State and National conentions in the year following the year is which representative conventions are held shall be elected by the delegates who atended the several next preceding represent ive conventions. In the year following the ear in which no representative convention are held, the delegates from the severopresentative districts, who attended the ext preceding county convention, shall ales and vote a provided under rule three. The telegates shall meet in their respective rep rescritative districts, not more than 30 or let han 10 days provious to the time fixed for the state convention at a place soluted by he chairman, by and with the consent of the executive committee."

The adoption of this rule by the committee s in deference to the apparent desire of the urty to avoid the necessity of holding two onventions, and postpone the nemination a andidates until after the Democrats has placed their ticket in the field. Under the rovisions of the new rule, if it is finally approved by the next county convention, the lelegates will meet shortly before the date fixed for the state convention, after all candi dates for state offices have been announced and will therefore be in a position to know the desires of their constituents as much so a I new delegates had been elected.

The action of the committee in this respect will certainly meet with the approva I the voters of the party. One year ago the Potraville Republican and a handful of bronic kickers were greatly agitated because the state delegates had been elected a year previous to the holding of the state conver tion. Now that objection has been revove by the adoption of the rale referred to above and that sheet is the first to raise its voice against the approval of the ride.
