**CRASH AT NEWBURGH.**

**Fatal Accident to a West Shore Express Train.**

**FIVE PEOPLE INSTANTLY KILLED.**

**Eighteen Seriously and a Number Slightly Injured—Of the Wounded Two Will Probably Die—The Train Jumped the Track and Ran Into a Freight.**

NEWBURGH, N. Y., July 14.—West Shore day express No. 1 was wrecked in the West Shore freight yard here. The train consisted of locomotive No. 293, baggage and express car, a smoking car, and a day coach and the parlor car "Lurline". The engineer was Daniel Shabb and the conductor Richard Anderson. The train was a few minutes late at Corwall, four miles south of here, and was running very fast. When it reached the switch which connects the main line with the West Shore freight yard, a mile south of the station, the engine picked up, it is supposed, a loose object, which caused it to jump upon a frog and leave the track.

**A THIEF'S ROMANCE.**

**Annie Morris Masqueraded as a Man for Fifteen Years**

MILWAUKEE, July 14.—A simple arrest by the police on a dispatch from the Fond du Lac authorities has brought out quite a romantic story. Chief Janssen arrested on Fond du Lac on a charge of grand larceny. The search developed the fact that Frank Blunt was a woman. For fifteen years Blunt was the masquerading woman was known, had dressed and acted as a man, drinking, smoking, gambling and swearing with the rough crowd in which her life was passed, and not once was her identity known. When taken before Chief Janssen the erstwhile Blunt and her name was Annie Morris. She is a native of Nova Scotia, her family living in Halifax. Annie ran away from home when two years younger. **Two Gunboats Force Their Way to the Capital. Exchanging Shots with Stammer Force on the Way—The King in Council with His Advisors.**

LOANPONG, July 14.—The Times correspondent at Bangkok telegraphs that the Siam government refused to permit two more French gunboats to enter the Mekong river, twenty miles from the mouth of which Bangkok is situated, and threatened that if the gunboats attempt to cross the bar at the mouth of the river they would be met by a Siam force, and officially responsible for beginning war upon Siam.

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
